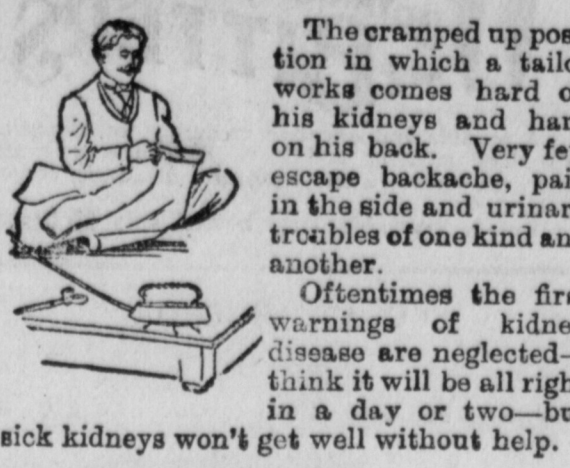

## SHE CONQUERS KANSAS.

JOKES AT THE LIQUOR CRUSADERS DIE ON THE LIPS OF THE JOKERS.

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 20.—Mrs. Carrie Nation is no longer laughed at in Kansas. The jokes of the first few days of her crusade have died on the lips of the jokers, and now uneasiness and alarm possess these men.

Mrs. Nation's work is spreading. It is called "Nationalism," and she is taking hold of the people very fast. She has already possessed the women. They cannot see the laughable side of the matter; they can only feel the force of the truths she utters.

In the local papers now appear three or four despatches every day from small towns in different parts of the State. You will learn from these that "Wichita is aroused," has held a mass meeting and made a demand on the Mayor and Council that they enforce the prohibitory laws. You will learn that Hutchinson is urging a vigorous fight on the jinks, and you will read the account of raids on saloons in Arkansas, City, in Winfield, in Halton and in Anthony.

A druggist spills his stock of liquors into the gutter in front of his store, to the delight and enthusiastic approbation of several hundred persons. A saloon keeper acknowledges his conversion and closes up his place. In another part of the State the liquor sellers, warned by an angry public, pack up their belongings and leave the town. The events of three weeks in the State are significant. No one ignores the meaning of them.

While Mrs. Nation was in jail at Wichita reading her Bible and sending out messages through the newspapers, Mrs. E. B. Hoffman, of Enterprise, whose son is Mayor of that town, invited her to visit her when she obtained her freedom. The two women stoned three saloons in Enterprise and destroyed everything in them that was of any value.

The raid on the saloons of Enterprise was reported all over the State. It had an immediate effect. Mass meetings were held in many towns and demands were made on the Mayors and the Councils to enforce the prohibitory laws.

In Anthony twelve women went out, with stones in their aprons and hatchets in their hands. They demolished four saloons, wrecking \$2,000 worth of property. The husbands went along to protect them. Three school-girls, daughters of the raiders, accompanied them and helped in the destruction.

A Law Enforcement League for Reno county was organized at Hutchinson to enforce the prohibition laws. At Harper a committee of the "leading ladies" of the town visiting the saloon keepers and told them if they did not close their property would be destroyed.

The feeling against the saloons spread into Arkansas. At Dalton, a little town near Poplar Bluff, five members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union broke up two "blind tigers" and spilled their liquors in the street.

At Wellington, Kan., the Mayor compelled all the saloons to close. At Eureka the women of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union petitioned the Probate Judge to refuse licenses to druggists of the town to sell liquor, 258 signing the petition.

At Halton the people were summoned to a mass meeting by the ringing of a church bell. After the meeting they went in a body to three saloons and broke up everything of value in them.

At Wakefield a barrel of whiskey was broken open and its contents emptied in the streets.

At Wichita a crowd of men, women and boys destroyed the saloon of Henry Schmidt. Most of the boys were students of the Methodist College. A brother of the saloon keeper was badly hurt. After the raid several fights occurred in the streets, and one woman was hurt by a stray bullet fired by a saloon man.

In the capital of Kansas, Mrs. Nation's crusade has been even more decisive. She was the laughing stock of everyone when she came to the city. She was jeered and hooted at in the streets. But to-day every saloon in Topeka has been closed. There is a Vigilance Committee of a thousand men organized with officers to stop any attempt to open the saloons.

Topeka is "dry." Not a drink can be had, unless at the drug stores, and the druggists use greater precautions than ever before in selling liquor.

The Attorney General of the State has been made to understand the force of the sentiment, and his conduct since Mrs. Nation came to Topeka has been in accord with that sentiment. The Chief of Police of Topeka and the Sheriff of Shawnee county have become very industrious in suppressing the liquor traffic. They have given the saloon keepers a certain time in which to move their illegal property from the city. The District Judge has issued ten injunctions restraining the saloon men from selling liquor and property owners from renting their buildings to them.

In the Legislature the effect of this "Nationalism" is seen. This week the Senate advanced the prohibition bills of Hurrel, of Jackson, to first place on the calendar. The Senate passed the most important of these bills at a special meeting—one which, if it becomes a law, will make the prohibition laws in Kansas much more stringent.

All these things were brought about by a woman who had felt just what the women of Kansas have been feeling for twenty years. She prayed and petitioned for a long while, like the other women, but at last she ceased to pray and petition and acted. The women of Kansas found a leader in one who secures results. They turned to her with enthusiasm and are following her with great courage and determination.

"It is not wrong to destroy that which is in itself wrong," says Mrs. Nation, and the women are with her in this belief. Few doubt that this movement will cease until there has been a great change in the prohibitory laws of Kansas and until these laws are rigidly enforced.

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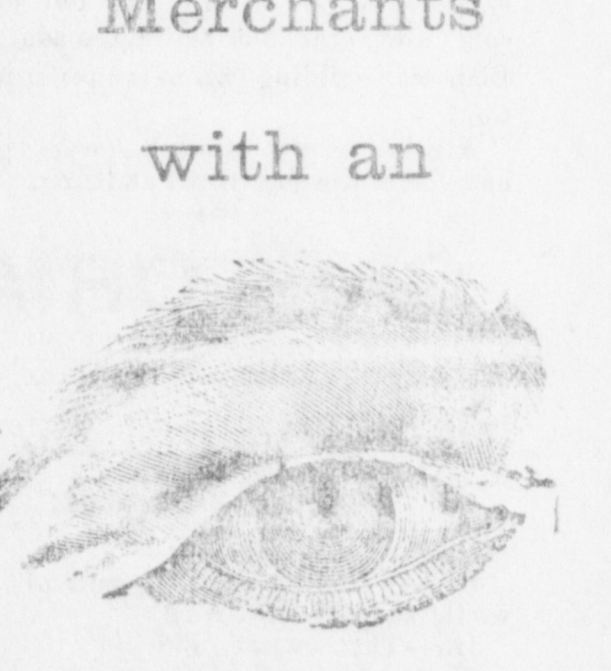
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
