THE DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, Feb. 23—When the house of commons met yesterday it went into supply and took up the estimates of the department of marine and fisheries. In reply to a query by Sir Hibbert Tupper, the minister of marine stated that, after being operated in ice on the Atlantic coast one year the new steamer Minto had had to have a large number of rivets fixed up. As the number was larger than the minister thought should have been the case he wrote to the parties who built the vessel about it and suggested they should bear half the cost. They had previously intimated they could not afford to have their reputation as shipbuilders suffer. A reply to the suggestion that they bear half the cost, which was \$4,500, was now being awaited.

Replying to Sir Hibbert Tupper the minister of marine said that in connection with a new vessel to be used chiefly for cable and such purposes and also to take the place of the Newfield and a substitute vessel for the Druid, and the government proposed to lend all possible encouragement to the effort being made to establish the iron shipbuilding industry at Halifax, it was proposed to call for tenders for the new vessel to be made in Canada and he thought that even if it cost a little more to have them built in Canada it would be to the interest of the country that such should be done.

Sir Louis Davies promised, at the request of Mr. Rudolph Lemieux, that if the steamer Stanley was available he would endeavor to have her make a trip in December to the Magdalen Islands in order to carry mails etc., there.

The matter of improving the St. Lawrence River was considered.

Replying to Mr. Fowler, Sir Louis Davies said new lights were to be arranged for in New Brunswick as follows: Perry's Point, Zephyr Rock Ships, Gray's Point and Hampstead wharf, and a lightship on the Lurcher Rocks, in the Bay of Fundy.

Referring to the fishery regulations Mr. Hackett said that the department was suffering in popularity from the straight way in which the regulations were being enforced out of season.

Sir Louis, in reply, admitted that this might be so, but nevertheless he was going to do his duty and see that the fisheries were protected.

Dealing with the aid given to bait freezers, Sir Louis Davies said that there was no grant ever made in the maritime provinces that had done so much good as that to bait freezers.

Dr. Kendall, who was instrumental in establishing this system, made a very practical speech dealing with this question. He said that for lack of bait all fishermen in the maritime provinces lost about 800,000 days. By the extension of the system it would be possible to add one million or one and a half million to the industry in the maritime provinces.

About 110 small freezers would be sufficient. When with improved cold storage in cars, fish could be sent west as far as Chicago. So far there was not a good cold storage car to be had in Canada. Mr. Blair was building two new ones at Moncton.

All the fishery estimates were passed and the house adjourned at 10.25.

BILINGUAL SOCIETY ORGANIZED AT ST. JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY.

ST. JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY, Feb. 23—During the past scholastic year Rev. Dr. Guertin founded a society now known as Lefebvre Bilingual Society. The object of this society is to encourage and promote the study of French and English by the English and French students. Weekly meetings are held and the proceedings are carried on in each language alternately. On a French night all speak French, on an "English" night all speak English. Thus the minutes of a French meeting are written in English, and vice versa. The members of this body are French and English students who can speak the two languages. A positive proof of ability to do so is the qualification of membership. Thursday evening this society gave its second public entertainment. Some ten members were elected this year and each spoke in the language not his own. Their efforts were very successful and their example will undoubtedly, encourage many to become bilinguals.

Messrs. McInerney, Landry, Gaudet and Leger deserve the flattering praise that was given to them.

At the last meeting of St. Patrick's Academy, Leo Bradley and Jos. Keilher won the debate against Ray Landry and Nap. Michaud. The subject of debate was "Resolved that written examinations are preferable to oral ones."

The last manual of the school law, lately issued by the Board of Education, contains the following paragraph in regard to holidays, which will no doubt interest a good many people:

"The anniversary of the Queen's birthday shall be observed as a holiday in all schools; also Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and any day proclaimed by the Lieutenant Governor as a public holiday throughout the province, Good Friday and the Monday and Tuesday following Easter. The anniversary of the landing of the Loyalists shall be observed as a holiday in the schools in the city of St. John. When the Queen's birthday, Loyalist day, or a proclaimed holiday, falls on Saturday, the number of teaching days in the term shall not be thereby increased."

OCEAN HORROR.

OVER HUNDRED LIVES LOST ON RIO DE JANEIRO.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 23—The sinking of the Pacific mail steamer Rio de Janeiro after striking a rock in the Golden Gate during the dense fog yesterday morning, was the most appalling disaster this coast has known for many years. Most of the bodies of the 120 or more victims are at the bottom of the sea, and many of them may never be recovered. The water where the ship lies is deep and the current swift, and the dead, with most of the wreckage, probably will be carried out into the Pacific. The number of lives lost may never be known exactly owing to the fact that the ship's records were lost, and it is practically impossible to tell just how many Chinese were on the steamer. The Call to-day, basing its figures on statements of the Pacific mail steamship officials, says that 122 persons perished; the Chronicle gives the number at 128, and the Examiner states that 111 cannot be accounted for. The vessel, with its valuable cargo, will be a total loss. Much difficulty has been experienced in obtaining the names of the passengers and crew.

R. P. Schwerin, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific Mail Steamship company, in discussing the loss of the Rio De Janeiro, said he thought the blame was due to Captain Ward in bringing his vessel in during a fog.

"Time and again," said Mr. Schwerin, "we have warned our captains never to leave or enter port during a fog. It is erroneous to think that when a pilot boards a vessel that the captain has no mere responsibility. A pilot is simply a guide for a captain."

"The statements made to me by Pilot Jordan indicate that there was a fog hanging around the heads, and I think that undue haste was shown by the captain in bringing his vessel in. I cannot understand why there should have been so much haste shown, considering the vessel lay outside all night. Captain Ward was a careful officer, and I learn that when he reached Honolulu with the Rio he waited outside the bay for eleven hours, rather than take any chances in the rough weather. Of course he is not here to speak. I wish that he were, for he was one of our best officers. He was brought up in our service, and we all feel deeply over his loss and those of his comrades."

"I cannot state exactly the value of the Rio De Janeiro, but it is between \$800,000 and \$900,000. We have between \$400,000 and \$500,000 insurance on the vessel, part of which is carried by insurance companies and part of which we carry ourselves. The value of her cargo was probably between \$150,000 and \$200,000. I do not think she had any amount of specie on board."

In reference to further questions Mr. Schwerin stated that he did not think there was the slightest chance for raising the vessel.
