MISSIONARY WORK.—Rev. J. R. deWolfe Cowie, organizing Secretary of the Church of England in the Diocese of Fredericton, gave a very interesting and instructive address to quite a large audience on the work that is being carried on in that Diocese, or in the Province of New Brunswick, in the Church of England Sunday School building on Monday evening. His address was interspersed with lantern views of the different bishops under whom the work has been carried on during the past century and also of churches and other scenes in different parts of the province. His address was very interesting and those who were not present missed a rare treat. Some of the views along the St. John river were very pretty and were quite a treat to those who had never been in that part of the province. Mr. Cowie is a very fluent speaker and his address was very much enjoyed by those present. He told how money was raised in some parts of the diocese to carry on the work, which was very interesting. He preached in St. Mary's church on Sunday morning. He also gave an address in Rexton on Tuesday evening.

A KENT COUNTY LADY MARRIED IN LONDON.—A quiet but very pretty wedding was that celebrated on April 13th at St. Mary Abbotts cathedral, London, when Miss Margaret Coates, formerly of Rexton, Kent Co., N. B., was married to Mr. Stanley Stewart Heritage, son of the late Judge Heritage of London. The church had been handsomely decorated for the occasion with palms and cut flowers, the altar being a mass of tube roses and ferns. Promptly at 12:30 the bridal procession was formed. The bride looked very handsome in a light grey travelling costume with white Mouseline de soie and turquoise panne trimmings, and wore a large chiffon hat to match. Cannon Pennefather, assisted by three curates performed the ceremony. Miss Dudgeon, an intimate friend of the bride, was maid of honor, while Mr. Leopold Heritage, the groom's younger brother, acted as best man. When the register had been duly signed the bridal party left the cathedral to the strains of Mendelssohn's Wedding March. After a sumptuous luncheon at Prince's the young couple left for an extended tour through England, Holland, Belgium and France. Mr. and Mrs. Heritage will make their permanent home in Paris, spending the summer months at Villa Nogent, the groom's country residence. Both the young people are well known and popular members of the English colony in the French capital.

FIRE AT BUCTOUCHE.—About three o'clock last Friday morning fire broke out in Mr. Anthony Grattan's warehouse at Buctouche, opposite the Bay View Hotel, and before its progress could be intercepted by the townspeople, three buildings had been razed to the ground and some thousands of dollars worth of property destroyed. From Grattan's warehouse the fire spread to A. B. Cormier's two large stores adjoining and these were also destroyed. Mr. Grattan's house nearby was saved only by a great effort, the service rendered by the use of Mr. J. D. Irving's fire engine. Three buildings in all were burned and after quite a fight the fire was under control at six o'clock. The Bay View Hotel, opposite where the fire started, was in danger of destruction, but the absence of a wind saved this as well as the whole town from being completely wiped out. Mr. Gorman, proprietor of the Bay View, had a sample room in Grattan's warehouse and Mr. J. A. McLeod, representing the Amherst Boot & Shoe Company, lost all his samples in it. Mr. Cormier's two stores were occupied by himself and Samuel Legere, a tailor. The latter's stock was saved, but Mr. Cormier lost flour and everything he had stored in his warehouse. The Cormier building would be worth about \$2000 and only small insurance. Mr. Grattan had some insurance on his building. Mr. Grattan's house was saved by a hard effort.

COAL SUPPLY IN KENT CO.

COMPANY FORMED WITH \$1,000,000 CAPITAL.
BUCTOUCHE, June 4.—The people of Kent county are considerably excited over discoveries of mineral wealth recently made which may, when properly developed, place Kent county well to the front among important mining centres of the provinces. Coal, of an excellent quality has been found. For some weeks operations have been in progress at Carlisle, where, it was reported, there were indications of large coal deposits. Several small seams were struck, and good coal obtained, though not in any great quantity. Quite recently, a five foot seam of house and steam coal has been discovered and arrangement for active developments are being made.

Mr. Polley, of New York, mining expert, is organizing a company, the capital stock of which will be \$1,000,000 with the object of working the mine as well as the manganese mine recently found a few miles back of Carlisle. The head office of the company will be at Moncton.

Those interested in the mine are of the opinion that under favorable circumstances it can be made one of the most valuable properties in the province, and that no difficulty will be experienced in mining 1,000 tons a day after the preparations are fairly under way.

It is the intention to build a branch railway to tap the I. C. R. at or near Coal Branch probably between that place and Birch Ridge. A large quantity of the coal will be shipped to St. John and the I. C. R. is also expected to be a good customer, but Montreal, Quebec, and River du Loup are the principle markets which the company hopes to invade.

In addition to the coal property, the company will also work a manganese mine recently discovered. Very little has yet been done on this, but an 18-foot seam has been found, and those interested are jubilant.

Borings for coal have also been made in Dendas on the Cocagne river. The prospectors got down 800 feet and found three small seams. At that depth they struck a quick sand formation and moved their drill to another locality in the hope of avoiding it. They were successful, however, in getting enough encouragement to warrant them in making further search, and they are of the opinion they have struck a good thing. The seams already reached are thought to be an extension of the coal seams at Newcastle and at Coal Branch.

The recent fire here would have resulted much more severely had it not been for the excellent work done by Mr. J. D. Irving's fire engine. The engine, which is owned by Mr. Irving for the protection of his own properties, was put into commission by him for the public good and the citizens are grateful.—St. John Telegraph.

Mrs. John T. Carter, of Sackville, received word on Sunday afternoon of the death at Philadelphia at one o'clock this morning of her sister, Mrs. M. E. Boltenhouse. Mrs. Boltenhouse was 66 years of age, a native of Sackville and daughter of the late Jonathan C. Black. Her two daughters Mrs. Hite and Mrs. Massey and her sister Mrs. R. V. Bowser were with her during her long and painful illness. Her brothers are Samuel, of Calais, Albert, of Boston, Benjamin, of St. John, and William, of New Kensington, Penn.
