THE WORLD OVER.

SEATTLE, Wn., June 1.—George McLigan, of Liberal, Kansas, who says he is president of the Eagle City Mining and Exploration Company, while in this city awaiting the sailing of a vessel for the Yukon, was last night robbed of \$17,000. He was drawn into a dark alley by two men as he was passing down a brightly lighted street, in a busy section of the Tenderloin, sandbagged and despoiled of the money by the ripping open of his shirt, underneath which the money was concealed. He reported his loss to the police, but no clue has as yet been obtained to the perpetrators.

NEW YORK, June 1.—The Dickson Locomotive Co. is engaged in an order for 12 locomotives for the Intercolonial railway, of Canada, comprising five consolidated and seven 10 wheel types. All of these engines are equipped with the Cleveland cylinder. One of the 10-wheelers is completed, and it is proposed to place it on exhibition at the Pan-American exposition as part of the Canadian exhibit by courtesy of the minister of railways and canals of Canada. In the meantime it is being put in service on the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western. There are some features about the engine which are likely to awaken lively interest among railroad men, the principal one being the Cleveland cylinder, with its central exhaust and the arrangement of a annular exhaust pipes.

CHICAGO, June 1.—The Record-Herald says: Plans are being perfected for the establishment of a gigantic bankers' bank. The deal is being engineered by Oakley Thorne, president of the North American of New York, whose representative W. S. Coursey has spent a week in Chicago discussing the matter with Chicago bankers. The stock of the bank will be issued only to banks, one share each to one of the largest banks in the country. It will be necessary for a bank to be a shareholder in the new institution in order to make deposits with it. The headquarters will be in New York.

NEW YORK, June 3.—George Chandler of Irvington, a boy of adventurous spirit, knew enough about electricity to know that when linemen work in mid air and are insulated from the ground they can grasp a trolley wire without injury, providing they touch no other wire. So the boy often ascended the pole and grasped wires without harm, much to the surprise of his companions below.

Last night George had a wire in his hands, and with this he told his boy friends he would produce an electric light by connecting a trolley and a telegraph wire. He mounted the telephone pole which stood almost in front of his house. He had a wire in his hand, and this he threw over the trolley wire. Then reaching out on the cross-arm of the pole, George swung the other end of his short wire over the heavy bare wire that supplies electric light for the town. Instantly there was a light. George was between the ends of the wires connecting the electric and trolley wires and the light came from his bare hands. The boys below shouted approval.

The body of the boy almost loosened from its place on the cross-arms and swung out with the light coming from the hands. Then the body fell headlong, burning and smoking, with his hands fairly burned to carbon. A doctor said the boy had been killed instantly by the shock and what his companions took for a daring swing in mid air was only the convulsive movement of a body twisted and contorted by a powerful electric current.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 3.—Benj. Setty, alias Watson, aged 28 years, narrowly escaped lynching at the hands of an infuriated mob of 500 citizens of McKeesport, Pa., this morning. Setty is alleged to have assaulted a four-year-old daughter of Thomas Sullivan. The police were forced to use their Maces to keep the crowd off while Setty was escorted to the police station. The child is in an unconscious condition and fears are entertained that she will not recover. Great excitement still prevails in McKeesport, and the police are keeping a strict watch on all streets surrounding the prison, lest a mob should be formed to break into the place.

A SAD OCCURENCE.

MOTHER KILLED BY HER BARY'S SCRATCH.

NEW YORK, May 31.—Mrs. Mary Himmerich, twenty-two years old, and a bride of but one year, died on Tuesday from erysipelas, at her home, No. 182 Meserole street, Williamsburg. The disease was caused by her baby, three months old, scratching her cheek with its finger nails. Mrs. Himmerich was the wife of John Himmerich, a musician, and when the infant was born the young couple were very happy. But the little one was very sickly, necessitating constant care on the part of the mother, who, nevertheless, called her child "Little Sunshine."

It was on Thursday afternoon of last week, and while Mrs. Himmerich was seated at the window of her apartments exhibiting the baby to the children in the street, that the little one playfully scratched her left cheek. The wound bled a little, but seemed so trifling in its nature that Mrs. Himmerich paid no attention to it. The following day, however, her cheek began to swell and pain her.

Becoming alarmed, Mrs. Himmerich went to a dispensary, but the medicine she received did not relieve the pain. On Saturday her husband summoned Dr. J. Bookbinder, of No. 1,250 Madison street. He diagnosed the case as erysipelas and treated the woman accordingly.

Mrs. Himmerich was at first unable to account for her illness. Suddenly the scratch made by the baby occurred to her and the physician unhesitatingly attributed the erysipelas to the wound made by the child's nail.

The mother was almost heartbroken over the fact that her child should have been the innocent cause of her condition, and more especially because of the fact that her physician told her that the disease might have a serious ending. Taking the child in her arms the woman repeated many times, "I don't blame you, my little sunshine."

Mr. Himmerich continued to grow worse and on Sunday took to her bed. She died in agony on Tuesday night.

YOUNG WIFE FOUGHT IN VAIN FOR LIFE.

STRUGGLED EVEN AFTER JEALOUS HUSBAND HAD GIVEN HER A DEATH WOUND.

PAWTUCKET, R. I., June 1.—In a local undertaking shop side by side lies the body of William Martineau and his wife. The latter was murdered by her husband, who killed himself. In the town of Lincoln, Albert Fairbanks is nursing a dangerous wound from a pistol shot fired by Martineau because Fairbanks tried to save Mrs. Martineau from death.

Martineau and his wife separated a week ago. The wife was to return to her home in Bethel, Vt., next week, but in the meantime was paying a visit to her cousin, Mrs. Henry Harper, near Lincoln.

Martineau appeared at the Harper homestead while the family were at dinner. Mrs. Martineau saw him enter the farmyard, and thinking he had come to say good-bye arose to meet him. Martineau called to his wife to come into the yard.

As she reached the threshold he drew a revolver and declared he was going to kill her. She stepped back into the kitchen and Martineau fired.

Mrs. Harper caught up her infant and screamed. Martineau told her to "shut up" or he would "give her a dose of cold lead." The baby cried and Martineau pointed the pistol at its head and said "Shut up, or I will shoot you too."

Mrs. Harper ran into the yard. Looking through the window she saw Martineau and his wife having a fierce struggle in the house. She called to Albert Fairbanks, a farm hand to go in, as Martineau was killing his wife.

Fairbanks went to the door and peering in saw the body of Mrs. Martineau on the floor. Martineau saw him and fired, the bullet entering the farmhand's arm. Fairbanks ran into the yard and Martineau fired three more shots after him.

Fairbanks turned to go into the house again. As he reached the steps he heard another shot. Entering he found that Martineau had killed himself. His body lay beside that of his wife.

In his hand was a revolver with one chamber empty. On the table was a box of cartridges. After emptying the revolver he had loaded it again.

On the window sill was a bottle two thirds full of whiskey. A tumbler stood near by. After killing his wife Martineau had taken a drink of whiskey to fortify him for suicide.

The Martineaus were married a year ago last October. The husband was thirty five years old the wife twenty-two. They first met in the home of Mrs. Harper, where the tragedy took place, and were married ten days later.

Martineau was in the habit of boasting of his wife's beauty and of their short courtship. He was extremely jealous and the couple had frequent quarrels.
