

GRAND ANSE NOTES.

JULY 15, 1901.—Weather continues fine with an occasional dash of rain, which is a help to crops, except hay which will in most places be light, as weather was too dry during the month of June, and rain now will not assist that crop to any great extent. This village will not be affected very much by a light hay crop, as potatoes, wheat and oats are chiefly grown. Since the erection of J. W. Damas' potato starch factory here many more potatoes are raised than formerly, as they are always sure of being able to sell, even if the prices were low. Before the factory started, when the American market was low, potatoes could not be shipped from here, because after paying freight and duty their would be nothing for the snipper. Much more wheat is grown here and in this vicinity since roller process flour mills have been erected. The flour ground in these mills is much better than flour ground in the old style grist mills. In fact it is equal to the best grades of imported flour, many preferring it to the imported article.

The social dance given by Mrs. F. Meroney at Waterloo, was well attended. Among the number from a distance who attended we noticed Howard McIntosh, foreman in W. S. Loggie's lobster factory, Stonehaven, Miss Minnie Sisk, Pokeshaw, Michael McCarthy, school teacher of Blackville, N. B., Miss Maud Salter, Pokeshaw, B. Flett, clerk in W. S. Loggie's store at Pokeshaw, Miss Jefferies, Will. Carey, Black Rock, and many others.

This road will be a great benefit to the people doing business in that place, as the old road runs along the bank and was constantly drifting up with sand from the beach, making hauling very hard. Men are paid one dollar per day.

A farmer's meeting was held in St. Patrick's Hall Friday evening for the purpose of organizing a farmer's Institute, Rev. S. J. Doucet acting as chairman. Jos. Poirier, M. P. P., spoke briefly in French, Mr. Tomkins, government organizer, followed in a pleasing and forcible address on modern farming and methods adopted by farmers in his section. Mr. Tomkins is a fluent speaker and might be called an orator. In his opening remarks he spoke of the objects of the Institutes, viz., to discuss practical problems of modern farming, to distribute information, to increase interest in farming and to develop local talent.

RICHMOND, Que., July 15.—About \$75,000 damage was done by fire at Warwick Village, on Sunday afternoon, and the Grand Trunk Railway Station destroyed. The village, which is about twenty miles from here, was practically deserted, as the population was at vespers when the fire broke out in the rear of the Grand Trunk freight sheds. The flames spread to the station and quickly destroyed it as the wind was blowing a gale. Twenty-two buildings were destroyed, as the village had no fire fighting applications. D. G. Alvin, the Grand Trunk roadmaster and his men went down from Richmond, and aided in checking the spread of the fire. The track was injured by the heat and the Quebec express was delayed at Victoriaville, but in the evening communication was restored, and the telegraph office opened. 
