WASHINGTON, D. C., U. S. Nevertheless, His Mojesty's ministry had the dignity of the British Empire in their charge and must protect it. It was considered a little nasty in the American Senate to diotate what must be done, instead of leaving the details to be amicably arranged and the language to be framed by the diplomatic agencies of the two governments, and they were therefore compelled, much against their inclination, to refuse to submit to what might have seemed to the English people and to other nations rather arbitrary dictation on the part of the American Senate. England wanted the United States to build the canal and own it and control it, but His Majesty's ministers would be unmindful of their duty if they did not insist upon its neutrality so far as commercial privileges were concerned. They did not expect that it would remain open for the convenience of the enemies of the United States in time of war. England had a neutrality treaty protecting the traffic of the Suez Canal, but it-would be suspended just the same in the time of war. All that England asked in the treaty proposed was equal privileges for all ships of all nations. If this is the real position of the British Government, as it probably is, it is safe to say that it is incomprehensible to most Americans. The contention of Canada that the tide of population is now flowing North instead of South across the border is negatived by the official records of exports and imports of settlers effects across the border, the value of these brought from Canada to this country last year being greater than it has been since 1893. If the number of emigrants from Canada decreased, those who did come were well-to-do instead of poor people. The value of settler's exports from the United States to Canada was somewhat smaller last year than in many preceding years. In 1894 these were valued at \$2,665,000, an amount that has not been exceeded since; last year they were valued at \$2,385,000. It is therefore contended that the balance of immigration is probably still in favor of the United States.

The United States will not consent to arbitrate claims against it by Great Britain unless Great Britain will agree at the same time to arbitrate American claims against herself.
