SAD PARTING AT JARDINEVILLE—William Waller, who has been living at Jardineville since 1850, and who assisted at the building of all the vessels built there by the firm of J. & T. Jardine, left the old place on Saturday last for Trout Brook, where he intends to spend the remainder of his days with his daughter Mrs. Chas. Ward. It was a touching scene when the old man, bent with years, said good-bye to some of his old friends and associates of ship building days and drove away from the spot where he had spent the best portion of his life. His daughter, Mary Ann, leaves shortly for Brooklyn, N. S., where she will live with her brother David, who has been a resident of that city for some time past.

DEATH OF MISS BESSIE BELL—The death occurred on Monday evening about seven o'clock of Miss Bessie Bell, only daughter of Mr. John P. Bell, at the age of 20 years and 8 months. Deceased had been ill for the past two and a half years but was not confined to her bed. Consumption, that fatal disease which drags so many to death, laid hold of her and for the last year or so she has not been able to do much work. On Monday morning she arose at her usual hour and sat in a chair by the window until about three o'clock in the afternoon, when she took a weak spell and was carried to her bed where she died about seven o'clock. She was conscious to the last, and just before she died she said good-bye to those who were near her. Miss Bell was a favourite among the young girls of the town and will be much missed. She was of a kind and loving disposition and had no enemies. She was a member of Richibucto Division, S. of T., under whose auspices the funeral was held. Much sympathy is expressed for Mr. Bell, as this is the third death in his house within the past four years. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at two o'clock. Rev. Mr. Smith, of New Glasgow, N. S., conducted the service at the house. The Sons of Temperance marched in a body to the grave where service was held. The interment was made in the Church of England cemetery.

HAZEL KIRKE—The Richibucto Amateur Dramatic Club gave an interesting and intelligent performance in the Temperance Hall, on Saturday evening last. The Hall was crowded and never was an audience assembled within its walls more gratified and satisfied than were those who witnessed the performance. Amateurs in name but professionals in the art and ability displayed by each in the respective characters they represented. The play is one that requires intelligent interpretation and that requisite was literally fulfilled. The different performers exhibited a thorough appreciation of the beauties of the play both in dress, style and execution. Where all acquitted themselves so well, comparisons might seem invidious, but no such feeling can be produced by according to the leading character, A. E. O'Leary, the distinction that his appearance upon the stage was the signal of unlimited admiration. A remarkable feature in the performance of each actor was the perfect representation of the character they respectively represented, constituting the chief excellence in all dramatic representations. We are not given to flattery, but if the lady actors estimated their worth as amateurs in the same ratio as the audience appreciated their efforts, they would soon have a right to be recognized as professionals, not as amateurs. The receipts of the evening amounted to \$73 00, and the purpose to which they are to be devoted must command the admiration of all—the lighting of our streets, the first evidence of intelligent organization in our

town. The Club may look forward to a success in their future efforts, guaranteed by an intelligent appreciation of their past. They purpose to produce in the Public Hall at Rexton, "Hazel Kirke" and we are confident we can anticipate for them a reception worthy of the intelligence of Rexton.
