THE WORLD OVER.

ALBANY, May 2.—Governor Odell today signed a bill amending the penal code by removing the minimum penalty for convictions for pool selling, book-making and making bets and wagers. Heretofore the penalty has been imprisonment for not less than one year or more than two years, together with a fine not to exceed \$2,000.

NEW YORK, May 2.—According to a private cablegram to-day, a provision in the contract between J. P. Morgan and Frederick Leyland & Co., gives the latter the right to continue to ply steamers between the Mersey and St. Lawrence; in all the remainder of the service the Leylands waive a controlling interest, including the newly acquired West Indian routes, and guarantee that they will not again enter the North Atlantic trade except as it applies to Quebec and Montreal for the term of 14 years.

The cablegram also said that for five days the Leyland line held off for these concessions, insisting that they should be permitted to run their steamers to Portland, Me., if not to Boston, during the time that navigation on the St. Lawrence is closed by ice. A compromise was effected, whereby Portland was omitted and the demand for a Canadian route granted. This means that for eight months of the year the Leylands will maintain a passenger and freight service between Liverpool and Montreal, with a call at Quebec going and coming.

PHILADELPHIA, May 2.—Antonio Beloz, 12 years old arrived in this port yesterday, a stowaway on the British steamer Elton, from Carthage. In explaining his attempt to exile himself from Spain, he told a strange story of crime. "I lived with my mother and father in Cadix," he said, "father became jealous of the visits of my uncle to the house, and in a quarrel, he killed him. He was arrested, but it was thought that he did the killing defending himself, and they let him go. About three months ago I woke up one night, hearing father and mother quarrelling. I crept into their room just as he struck her on the head with a club. He told me that if I let the police know he would kill me, but I did tell them. Then I was afraid and hid around the

docks, fearing that he would catch me. I was about to drown myself one night, because I believed I saw father looking for me."

The authorities are of the opinion that the lad is telling the truth, but as he is penniless he must return to a Spanish port on the Elton.

NEW CASTLE, Pa., May 3.—Mrs. Mary Sankey, mother of Ira D. Sankey the world-famous evangelist and singer, died at her home in this city to-day. She was 90 years old and death was due to her advanced age.

CHICAGO, May 3.—Robert Corbett, captain of the Iroquois ball club, and one of the first men in aquatic sports in Chicago, is dead. Mr. Corbett came of a family of oarsmen and was a brother of John Corbett who was champion oarsmen of America.

PROSSER, Washington, May 3.—With her hand and mouth stained with green from the grass and flowers she had eaten in her desperate hunger and with her features drawn in the dying agony of thirst, the body of the five year old daughter of W. B. Mathews, former county commissioner, who lost her way on the dreary wastes of Horse Heaven plains, nearly a week ago, was to-day found by searchers. The child in her agony, had crawled into a badger hole on the prairie and died.

From the appearance of the body, the child had been dead about 36 hours, and for five days and nights she had been without food or water.

Barefooted when she left home, the little girl in her wanderings had bruised and cut her feet, and had gathered the tough prairie grass and wound it around them for protection. Beside her in the badger hole lay a bunch of flowers and grass which she had been eating.

OWEN SOUND, Ont., May 3.—Steamer Germanic, which arrived here to-night, reports the sinking of the tug Tecumseh in Lake Huron, with the loss of three lives during a storm. The Germanic was on her way down the lake at 6 o'clock last night, and overtook the tug with her engines disabled and taking in water over her rail with every dip of the sea. The Germanic ran alongside the Tecumseh and took off three of six persons on board and took the tug in tow. After towing for three hours the tug was discovered to be sinking, and before the Germanic could lower a boat to the rescue, the tug went down. Those on board jumped into the water, but were paralyzed by the icy

PRISON FOR LIFE.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 3—"Guilty of murder in the second degree" was the verdict which a jury at 7.24 to-night rendered against Ann Maria Rathbun charged with killing her husband by poison intended for another.

A sentence of life imprisonment was immediately imposed by Judge Elmer, in accordance with the statute.

The jury had been out since 3.25 this afternoon. At 7.15 word was brought that they had agreed upon a verdict and a few minutes later they filed into the court room, which was still crowded with the throng who had witnessed the last scenes of the trial. Near the jury seats, beside her counsel, sat the accused. As the clerk put to the jury the formal questions as to their decision, her consternation was evident, and it was with difficulty that she arose to listen to the verdict.

"Guilty of murder in the second degree."

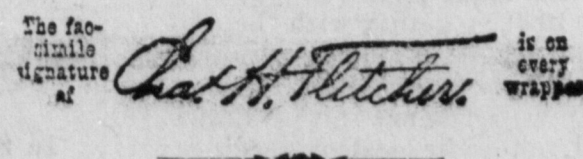
As the words were spoken Mrs. Rathbun sank back to her seat overcome. A few minutes later she was assisted from the court room by the sheriff and driven to the jail in a closed carriage. Then she will be taken to the state prison at Wethersfield.

William Rathbun died from the effects of poison which he drank in some coffee prepared for John F. Hart, a boarder at his house, and his wife's paramour, on December 21st last. As the result of the subsequent investigation, Mrs. Ruthbun was charged with the crime.

It has been the contention of the state that she poisoned the coffee with rough on rats, intending that Hart, who some months before, had transferred his attentions to another, should drink it. The defence claimed that Rathbun, jealous of Hart, poisoned the coffee and afterwards drank a small quantity himself to allay the other's suspicions, not suspecting that the amount taken would be fatal.

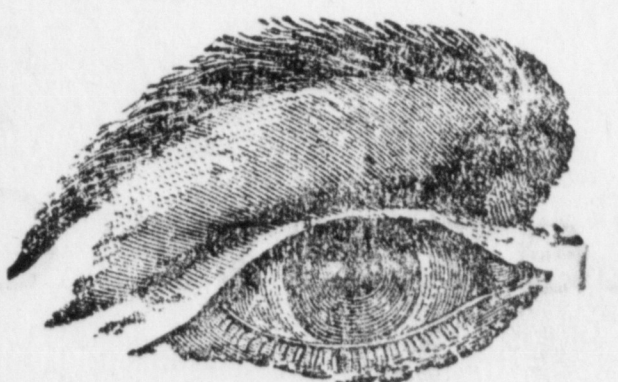
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
