JONES MAY NOT LIVE TO AGAIN ACCUSE PATRICK.

NEW YORK, May 11.-Suspecting that the illness of Valet Charles F. Jones may be due to some drug or other substance taken in secret, District Attorney Philbia has ordered that three detectives from his staff watch him constantly. Jones is the principal witness in the Rice case against Lawyer Albert T. Patrick.

Coroners' Physician Hamilton Williams and Police Surgeon Vosburg are convinc ed that Jones is dangerously ill and on their advice District Attorney Philbin had the valet removed from the House of Detention to a private hospital at No. 143 West Forty-seventh street.

There was a change for the worse in Jones's condition. He continued to refuse food and became steadily weaker.

The physicians regard his condition as so serious that he may not live to testify against Patrick when the lawyer is brought to trial for the murder of Millionaire Rice.

Jones is suffering from a disorder of the stomach, and has been unable to eat anything for six days except small quantiti of milk diluted with mineral water.

When Jones showed symptoms of illness it was suspected by members of the District Attorney's staff that the valet was making a deliberate attempt to starve himself to death. He once attempted to commit suicide and District Attorney has decided to prevent another attempt.





Origin of the Yosemite Valley. It is perfectly obvious to those familiar with glacial phenomena that Yosemite is quite an ordinary and necessary product of glacial erosion under the conditions prevailing in that locality. The main glacier came down Tenaya canyon, cutting it to a steep but fairly uniform grade. Yosemite valley is but a continuation of that gorge. 1 The end of the glacier at the time that. it was cutting Yosemite extended not far beyond Fort Monroe. It remained there for a long time and therefore plowed out the bottom of the valley to a considerable depth. Branch glaciers joined the Tenaya glacier when it filled Yosemite, coming down the valleys of Yosemite. Little Yosemite, Illilouette and Bridal Veil and other creeks and forming hanging valleys at the junction points. The formation of the vertical cliffs of the valley may have been due to undermining and may have been aided by the cleavage of the rocks. On the recession of the glacier doubtless the bottom of the valley was occupied by a lake which has since been partially filled by detritus and drained by the erosion of Merced river cutting through the rock wall at the foot of the valley. -National Geographic Magazine.
