DIED AT BASS RIVER.—On the 25th of May, at the home of his son William, Mr. Robert Marshall, one of Bass River's oldest residents, entered into rest in his eighty-seventh year, respected and loved by all that knew him. HE'S A LOBSTER.

An Eastport despatch says: One of the largest, if not the largest lobster ever seen in Maine, has been brought here from Grand Manan, N. B., and will be forwarded by express to a Roxbury, Mass., fish dealer. The crustacean, which measures four feet from the tip of the claws to the tip of the tail and weighs 23 pounds was caught in a trawl a few miles off the shore of Grand Manan. Its body measures two feet in length and its circumference is twenty inches. A lobster similar in size to the one brought here was taken a few years ago off Grand Manan, near where the latest one was caught, and is now in the Smithsonian Institute, Washington, D. C.

J. F. R. McMichael, night agent of this place, who has been visiting his parents at West Branch for the last four weeks, returned home Saturday.

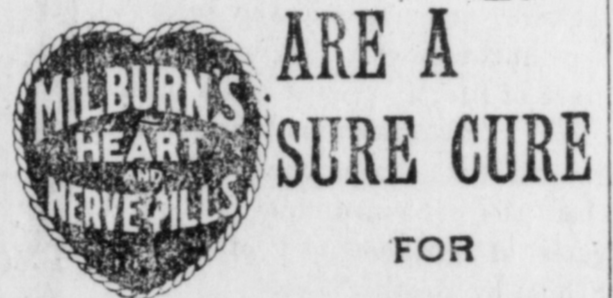
