ELOQUENT TRIBUTE TO THE QUEEN'S MEMORY.

The Fredericton Gleaner contains the following report of the addresses made by the Chief Justice and Mr. Phinney, K. C., at the opening of the Supreme Court on the 29th ult.:

Chief Justice Tuck said: We feel at this time that some remarks should be made on behalf of the Bench upon the life and death of our late Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria. During the past few days there have been many references by eloquent public speakers regarding the beauty and excellence of the life of her who at a very early age became our Sovereign, and who for over 60 years reigned so well. Perhaps in no portion of her great Dominion has greater regret or more sincere grief been shown than in this our native province. We have been true and devoted loyalists and loyal and true to Her Majesty. I well recollect the rejoicing at the city of St. John at the time of the coronation of the young Queen in 1837, and we have been her loyal and admiring and devoted subjects. We have known what Her Majesty has done towards maintaining righteousness and promoting peace. There have been wars, necessary wars, during Her Majesty's long reign, but we all know that her influence was ever for peace. And what else? She was the wife of a devoted and loving husband for whom she had the greatest love and regard, and she was the happy mother of nine devoted children. Losing her beloved husband, the Prince Consort, in 1861, she yet did her whole duty as a queen and strengthened the esteem in which she was held by all.

We have so long been taught to say, "God Save the Queen" that it comes strangely to our lips to say differently. It is a satisfaction to all her devoted subjects that she gave no evidences of mental decadence, but retained her wonderful faculties to the end, and no evidences of great physical failure or decay were shown either until almost the hour of her departure hence. This is very grateful to all of us. The time must come to all of us to depart and we all must pay the debt.

We mourn her death and our loss. In the whole history of England there has been no such illustrious Sovereign as Victoria. The Victorian era has been memorable in more ways and her reign will be remembered and respected as that of no other Sovereign has ever been. Our illustrious Sovereign of blessed memory, good Queen Victoria, and illustrious mother and the very best of women.

And she is succeeded by her son Edward, one who for the past forty years has been prominently before the eyes of England and of the world. Visiting us as he did in 1860 he won all our hearts. He was then a handsome, beautiful boy of nineteen and he made lasting, loving friends wherever he went. Upon the death of his father in 1861 he took his place beside his mother and before the nation. As Prince of Wales there has been no harder worked man in the kingdom and he has well discharged his duties. He has all the instruction and wise counsel of his father and the example of his illustrious mother and we believe that his reign will be a glorious one, and may he long reign. God Save the King.

MR PHINNEY, K. C.

Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., then addressed the Court as follows: May it please Your Honors:

Speaking on behalf of the Bar of the Province I desire to echo the sentiments of sorrow and sympathy because of the death of our good Queen Victoria which Your Honor the Chief Justice has so fittingly expressed.

Throughout the world I think it may be truthfully said that the legal profession stands everywhere for recognition of constitutional authority and in the British Empire it is second to none in its allegiance to the Imperial throne.

As lawyers, and apart together from our admiration as men and subjects for the noble woman and grand Queen, we as a profession should and do remember Queen Victoria as the most constitutional monarch who has ever sat upon the throne of Great Britain.

"In Queen Victoria," said Macaulay "her subjects have found a wiser, gentler, happier, Elizabeth."

No other monarch has so thoroughly comprehended the great truth that the powers of the Crown are held in trust for the people. Under her beneficent reign and largely due to her influence liberty has broadened, while respect for law and order amongst her people has been more fully enjoyed than at any other time in the history of the Empire and during no reign has a greater measure of political contentment been enjoyed. While mourning the departed Sovereign we join with the Bench in proclaiming our cheerful allegiance to the new Sovereign and our loyal, hearty wishes for long life and prosperity to King Edward VII.

The National Anthem was then sung lustily.

TO WEAR MOURNING.

The Chief Justice requested that all members of the Bar wear crepe upon the left arm during the period of mourning for the Queen.

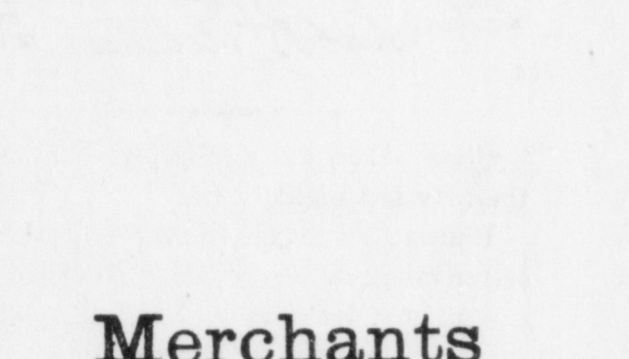
