BOY DROWNED .- A sad drowning accident occurred at Chandler's Point, about a mile below town, on Sunday morning. Three young French boys belonging to the North West, were at the point digging clams, and one of them, Arsene Cormier, aged about fifteen years, took his clothes off with the intention of having a bath. After wading around for a short time he started to wade to a stake a short distance out but before he had reached it he had gone beyond his depth and sank. The boys on the shore who were digging clams did not notice him go down and when they were ready to go home he could not be found. They came into town and told the news and on Monday morning several men went to the spot and after grappling for a short time found the body. It was brought to town where an inquest was held by Coroner T. J. Bourque. The jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning. The remains were taken to the North West for interment,

THE STORM -Although Richibucto has in the past been very fortunate in escaping from the heavy electric storms which have been raging in other parts of of the province, it can boast of having witnessed one of the heaviest for a good many years. Some of the oldest inhabitants say that the storm on Sunday night was one of the heaviest they ever experienced. The storm which had been brewing all the evening, and which was sure to follow such intense heat as was felt during the day, set in in good shape about half-past nine or ten o'clock and continfor about an hour. The lightning and thunder was something fearful, the lightning being so bright that it kept the town lighted up as if by electricity. Rain came down in torrents while it lasted, and the streets were pools of water. Several people were shocked by lightning. Jone Barnard, who was going home during the heaviest of it received a shock which made him unconscious for several minutes and which knocked him of the sidewalk into the ditch. It was sometime before he got over the effects of it. Two girls-Ethel Long and Mamie Tweedie-who were in the house at the time also received a shock, but they soon recovered from it. The lightning struck a barn belonging to Mr. George Long which was totally consumed with all its contents, including his winter's wood and about a ton of coal, besides a number of other useful articles. The lightning struck the barn about the centre and before the fire engine could be secured and got into working order the barn was almost burned to the ground. The Church of England Rectory was in danger of being burned, but by the untiring efforts of the large crowd of men who were at the scene of the fire, it was saved. Mr. Long's house also got quite badly scorched. A five-months-old calf belonging to Mr. Long was killed by the light ning, having been near the barn when the lightning struck. A horse at St. Charles was also killed by the lightning. No other damage was done, as far as can be ascertained. The storm was one which will not soon be forgotten by the people of Richibucto. - --




