KENT COUNTY COURT.

The July term of the Kent County Court opened here on Tuesday of last week, Judge Wells presiding. The following are the names of the grand jurors in attendance:

There was only one criminal charge, that of forgery against Alvin P. Kinread. The grand jury found a true bill.

The court was engaged all day Tuesday in the civil case of Talbot vs. Budd. This was an action for breach of contract and work and labour. The plaintiff claimed he had engaged with defendant to dig a well and had afterwards been discharged before completing the work without receiving any remuneration for the work.

On Wednesday forenoon the criminal case of the Queen vs. Alvin P. Kinread was taken up. It was charged that the accused had forged two promissory notes signed the name thereto of Louis P. Savoy, of Buctouche. It appeared that Savoy had bought a horse from Kinread who was selling agent for P. S. McNutt. Savoy claimed that he agreed to pay \$5.00 for the horse and gave his note for that amount. Kinread returned notes to the amount of \$52 which he contended was the price of the horse. It was claimed that all the notes except the \$5.00 note were forgeries. The jury returned a verdict of guilty and Kinread was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

The only remaining case was that of Alexander J. Girvan vs. Thomas C. Girvan on a promissory note. The note had been given to plaintiff by the brother of defendant who died about a year ago, and there was no other witness to the signature of defendant. Defendant claimed he had never signed the note and that it was a forgery. Verdict for defendant. Wm. D. Carter for the Crown, G. V. McInerney, K. C., for the defense.

CLOSING EXAMINATION AT MCNAIRN.

McNAIRN, Kent Co., July 8.—A very highly and creditable examination of the McNairn district school was held on Friday the 28th ult. The children showed marked improvement in the different branches taught and a thoroughness in practical knowledge.

The teacher, Miss Edith Dickie, of Bactouche, drilled the pupils in grammar, geography, history, health reader, arithmetic, singing, reciting, and various other branches too numerous to mention, after which the visitors were invited to take charge. Mr. C. C. Carlyle, of Mt. Carlyle, Coal Branch, took the school in hand, putting them through a very rigid examination, concluding with the impression that the children were well advanced in all the branches taught, which reflects great credit on the teacher, on no occasion being the least embarrassed but answered with a promptness which was admirable to listen to in so young a school.

The visitors, who numbered about twenty, referred to the good order. Mr. Wm. McNairn opened the addresses with a brief but very intelligent speech after which he gave Mr. Carlyle the invitation to address the school, which he did for about fifteen minutes dealing with the boys first, then calling the attention of the girls for about ten minutes on the principles of thoroughness in their studies. Several other speakers followed, all claiming that it was one of the best examinations that they had ever attended and closed with three hearty cheers for the teacher.
