SERIOUS ACCIDENT IN THE WOODS.—A correspondent writing from Barnaby River to THE REVIEW says: Quite a serious accident happened in the lumber woods here on Friday, Jan. 25th, when Mr. John F. Stevenson, of Molus River, Kent Co., who is employed with Messrs. P. Bogle and John Masterton, cut his foot open with an axe. The cut was a large one being about 7 inches long and 2 inches deep. Mr. Stevenson was in the act of "topping" a tree when in some manner the axe caught on the limb of another tree and glanced off, striking his foot. He lost a large quantity of blood before getting to the camp. Mr. Stevenson is highly respected here by all who knew him, and much sympathy is felt for him. He was called home about Christmas on account of the death of his mother. He will be laid up for some time. He was a first-class chopper and will be missed very much.

THE DEATH ROLL.

WHITE.—The death occurred on Monday morning about 4 o'clock of Mrs. Wm. White. Deceased, who had been sick at times for the past four or five years, was in her usual health until about a week ago when she was stricken with a severe cold and had to take to her bed. A doctor was called in and she appeared to be somewhat better towards the last of the week. On Sunday evening she got up without any assistance and seemed to be quite strong, but she took another bad spell during the night, and died at four o'clock the next morning. Heart failure was the cause of death. Mrs. White was a faithful member of the Presbyterian Church, and was much beloved by those who knew her. She had always a kind word for everybody and she will be greatly missed, not only by her relatives, but by her many friends. She was 65 years of age and leaves a husband and three children—two daughters and one son to mourn their sad loss. One daughter, Agnes and the only son, Stanley, are in the U. S., and the other daughter, Mrs. Thompson, has been with her for some time. The funeral will take place to-day (Thursday) at two o'clock. The remains will be interred in the Presbyterian burying ground at Kingston.

ROBERTSON.—We have also to record this week the death of one of the oldest lady citizens of Richibucto, in the person of Margaret, relict of the late Wm. Robertson, which occurred on Saturday morning about one o'clock. Deceased, who had been living with her son Roderick, had been in her usual good health up to a few days ago. She was very seldom sick and lived to the good old age of 83 years. She was born in Kingston, Kent Co., in 1817, two months after the arrival of her parents from Scotland. She lived in Kingston for a number of years and then went to Kouchibouguac where she married Wm. Robertson. They remained in Kouchibouguac for some time and then came to Richibucto, where Mr. Robertson secured a position with Mr. Desbrisay. They again removed to Kouchibouguac and a few years later Mr. Robertson was drowned. Mrs. Robertson then came to Richibucto where she has been living ever since. She leaves four sons, two in Richibucto and two in some part of the United States. The funeral took place on Monday morning at eleven o'clock. The remains were interred at Kouchibouguac alongside those of her husband. Owing to the bad state of the roads the procession was not very long. Rev. A. D. McLeod officiated, owing to the illness of Rev. D. Fraser.

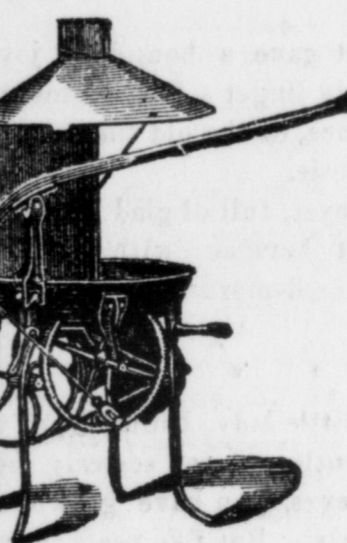
