#### GREAT BRITAIN'S DAY OF GRIEF.

THE REMAINS OF THE LATE QUEEN TRANSFERRED TO WINDSOR FOR INTERMENT.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Half a million of the late Queen's devoted subjects living on the shores of the Solent yesterday witnessed a majestic, awe inspiring spectacle, and bode a last farewell to their beloved ruler. The dominant note in the whole scene was its grand simplicity and, so far as human utterance was concerned, its silence. The sad procession glided along in beautiful order and precision, as though moved by some hidden power. No incident of any kind occurred to mar its stately beauty. There was no accident ashore or afloat. The weather was traditional Queen's weather. The prospects for favorable weather to-day are somewhat doubtful at this time (3 a. m.) Thousands of troops are now marching into London preparatory to taking their places on the line of march. With this military invasion is an equally large civilian invasion from the provinces and abroad.

COWES, Feb. 2.—The spectacle of two great monarchs followed by their women-kind and the noblest princes of Europe walking silently along the country road behind the bier blazing with precious stones will live long in the memory of those who saw it. The king's features bore the mark of grief. To all in the assemblage there will ever stand out one face, that of the German Emperor. Its arched, almost olive contours were turned fiercely towards the sun and his moustache brushed from the upper lip enhanced the firmness of his chin. It was apparent that the Emperor was undergoing severe mental strain. His face twitched nervously. "Every inch a King" was the manner in which the German Emperor was referred to. Almost behind His Majesty was the young Duke Arthur of Connaught. There was hardly time to recognize the individuality of these personages, including Prince Henry of Prussia and the Duke of Connaught, before the most truly pathetic sight of the day came in view. It was a simple little body. None were distinguishable from the others. All wore plain black dresses with long crepe veils and they followed meekly and with downcast heads. The first was the Queen of England. With her was the woman who, if she lives, will also hold the proud title Behind them walked the woman to whom every knee in England, however noble, is bowed in courtesy. There have been more magnificent pageants than that escorting the body of the Queen from Osborne house to the royal yacht, but never has been witnessed in the recent world's history a procession more remarkable in its combination of pomp and splendor with grief and humility.

#### PICCADILLY IS GORGEOUS.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—From Victoria station to Paddington station the streets of London are now draped in purple, black and white. Piccadilly is gorgeous. The lamp posts in the middle of the road along the route have been removed and the streets are being sanded preparatory to the function to-day. The cavalcade which will follow the coffin, with the King in the centre flanked by Emperor William and the Duke of Connaught, will exceed in brilliancy anything ever seen in England. There will be nearly fifty kings and princes, each wearing the uniform of his own country. Following this brilliant cavalcade will come the princesses in carriages. The order of precedence here observed emphasizes the great changes the death of Victoria has made among her daughters. The Princess Christian, Princess Beatrice and Princess Louise now yield places to the daughters of the King. The first carriage will contain Queen Alexandra, the Duchess of Fife, now Princess Royal, the Princess Victoria and Princess Charles, of Denmark. The second carriage will contain the daughters of Queen Victoria and the King of the Belgians.

#### THE FUNERAL.

COWES, Isle of Wight, Feb. 2.—The funeral started from Osborne at 1.40 p. m. The coffin reached the Albert at 2.25. Great silent crowds witnessed the progress of the procession to the pier. The Alderth started from Cowes at 2.55 p. m. Previous to the removal of the Queen's remains from Cowes the Bishop of Winchester held a service in the Chappelle Ardente. After the body had been embarked on the Albert, King Edward boarded the royal yacht in a launch and the procession started.

COWES, Feb. 2.—With grand, yet mournful display of naval pomp and power the body of Queen Victoria was borne this afternoon from its resting place in Osborne house to Portsmouth, the heart of England's navy. Not since Admiral Cervera's ships lit up the Cuban coast with their self consuming fires has anything been seen which in tragic splendor approaches the naval spectacle of to-day. Over the still waters between the roll of the six pounders came the dirge of Chopin's and Beethoven's funeral marches. The crews, accustomed to cheer with the heartiness which belongs only to "Jackies" stood silently among the decks, and the flags which usually floated defiantly in the breeze, drooped half way down the halcyards. The most powerful fleet England could gather on short notice lay inert and
