

THE WORLD OVER.

NEW YORK, April 20.—It is said at the office of the White Star line that Decatur M. Sawyer, the father of Otis Sawyer, a school boy, drowned at Lackville, Conn., and who is on the steamer Deutschland endeavoring to reach Liverpool before his wife reaches there on the Majestic, will be able to accomplish his object.

The Deutschland is due at Plymouth next Wednesday morning about the same time the Majestic should reach Queens-town. Queenstown is fifteen hours from Liverpool, Plymouth is six hours. Probably an effort will be made at Queenstown to prevent Mrs. Sawyer from learning of the death of her son.

The Majestic left New York at noon on Wednesday, the Deutschland at 3 p. m., on Thursday.

PITTSBURG, April 22.—One of the thrilling incidents connected with the flood conditions prevailing in this state, was the hair breadth escape from destruction of the Penna limited train West bound, near Tyrone yesterday. A boy riding frantically at the side of the track, wildly waving his cap, gave the warning to the engineer that saved the train from going full speed into a landslide. Even so, the train ran into a large rock, knocking off the cow catcher of the engine and the Pullman was badly damaged. At Altoona an engine was secured and the damaged car was taken out of the train. Some of the passengers said they thought the train must have been running nearly sixty miles an hour when the passengers suddenly were thrown forward in their seats by the application of the brakes by the engineer. Some who were looking out of windows at the time, saw the boy on the wheel waving his cap as the train flew passed him. The engineer had a difficult task to handle his train which was not only running fast but was heavy and the rails were slippery, which made checking its speed more difficult. J. R. Francis a former

governor of Missouri was one of the passengers.

NEW YORK, April 22.—A special cable to the Herald from London says:

Lockhart Agnew, who has been in Paris, virtually confirmed the statement that J. Pierpont Morgan bought and recovered Gainsborough for £30,000. This bears out the story circulated recently regarding the offers for the famous painting made by Mr. Morgan and A. Clark, who is a rival of the American art collector. Mr. Morgan first offered £25,000 for the picture, whereupon Mr. Clark offered £30,000 as the top price. Mr. Morgan promptly said that he was willing to pay £30,000, and as he was a heavy buyer at all times of costly art works, the Gainsborough went to him, the agreement being if he equalled any bonafide offer he should have the refusal. Mr. Morgan stipulated that the authenticity of the picture must be established beyond the shadow of a doubt. It is apparent that this has been done.

SALEM, April 22.—Best, charged with murder, has protested his innocence of the murder of Bailey. This is the second time that Mr. Mellish has visited Best, and the prisoner has made the request of him to call and see him whenever he can do so.

Mr. Mellish says that Best is in about the same condition apparently as when he appeared in court, and that he eats his food regularly, and sleeps well.

A Boston correspondent writes:—John C. Best, the Sackville man who stands convicted of murdering Geo. E. Bailey at Saugus, will make an effort to secure a new trial, but it is doubtful if the case is argued before next November. The convicted man is in good health, and appears confident that he will escape the electric chair. Rev. Mr. Melish, a Salem minister, has assisted Best during his trouble.

A Complicated Flag.

The Spanish royal standard is most complicated. The red and yellow of the Spanish flag is said to be derived from this occurrence: In 1378 Charles the Bold dipped his fingers in the blood of Geoffrey, count of Barcelona, and drew them down the count's golden shield in token of his appreciation of the latter's bravery. The shield, so marked, became the arms of Barcelona, which became part of Aragon, and its arms were taken by that kingdom.

Now to the royal standard: In the first quarter or upper left hand part of the flag are the arms of Leon and Castile, the lion and the castle; the second quarter is taken up, one-half by the arms of Aragon, one-half by the arms of Sicily. The upper third of the quarter (directly under the first) shows the Austrian colors, the lower two-thirds is divided between the flag of Burgundy and the black lion of Flanders; the upper third of the fourth quarter shows the checkers, another Burgundian device, while the lower two-thirds is shared by the red eagle of Antwerp and the golden lion of Brabant, and on the top of all this are two shields, one showing the Portuguese arms, the other the French fleur-de-lis. Considerable of a flag that!

Got the Watch.

A Camden lawyer put up a bluff successfully not long ago. A client came to him and explained that a young man had bought a watch from him on the installment plan. He made one payment, gave the watch to a young lady and skipped out. The client wanted to know if he could recover the watch from the young lady. 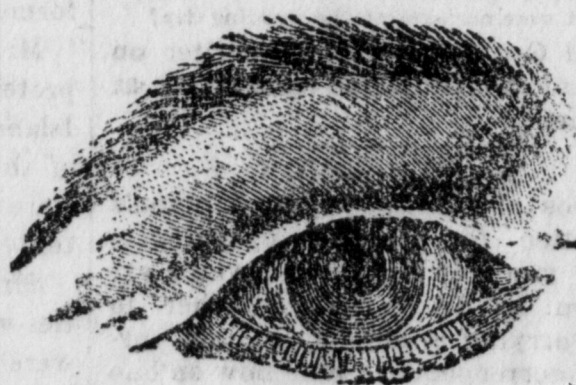
