DEATH OF MRS. STOTHART.—The death of Mrs. Stohart, widow of the late James Stohart, occurred at South Branch on Wednesday, the 26th of December. Mrs. Stohart, who was eighty-six years of age, came to Richibucto from Dumfriesshire, Scotland, in the year 1835. She was a member of the Jardine family of whom only two survive her—Mr. Thos. Jardine, Sr., of Jardineville, and Mrs. Duncan Robertson, of St. John. The remains were interred in the Presbyterian burying ground at Kingston on Saturday, the 29th, the funeral being very largely attended. The services were conducted at the house and grave by the Rev. Mr. Townsend, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Fraser. Mrs. Stohart leaves a large family to mourn their loss.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN STEVENSON.—We regret to have to announce this week the death of one of our most respected citizens, Mr. John Stevenson. Mr. Stevenson had been ill for some months as a result of a hemorrhage of the lungs with which he was attacked last summer, and his death was not unexpected. He died at his home in Richibucto last Friday evening. He was fifty-nine years of age and has resided in the County of Kent all his life. For many years he had been a deputy land surveyor and was well known throughout the whole County. By his death the town loses a good citizen and the province a most efficient and competent officer. It is to be regretted that he did not live to see the safe return of his son, Private Irving Stevenson, who is on board the Roslyn Castle on his return from South Africa, and is expected to reach home next week. The deceased leaves a wife, four sons and a daughter. The funeral which took place Sunday was largely attended by friends of the deceased from all parts of the County. Messrs. George E. Irving, James D. Irving, John Irving, William Irving and R. A. Irving, brothers-in-law of deceased and Wm. D. Carter were the pall-bearers. Rev. H. A. Meek conducted the funeral service.
