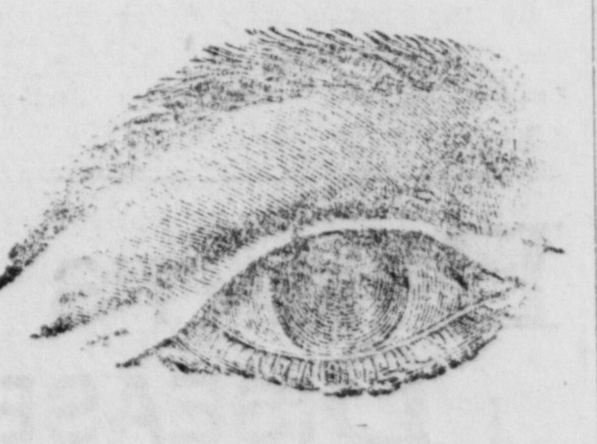

BOSTON, July 1.—Fire broke out at the Housac tunnel docks, Charlestown, just before 9 o'clock. An automatic signal was followed by three alarms from the city boxes as the flames spread. Within a few minutes of the first alarm piers 3, 4 and 5 were burning.

The burning piers are used by the Warren Line Steamship Company. The steamer Sachem, which was moored at one of the docks, was towed to midstream, but she was considerably scorched. On pier 5 half a dozen freight cars caught fire before they could be drawn to a place of safety.

At 9.30 the flames are raging furiously. Just before 10 o'clock the firemen obtained control of the flames. It is thought the loss will not be more than \$200,000.
