Grass got a good start in the spring and prospects of a heavy hay crop was excellant, but more rain is needed now. Grain also would require more rain. Besides farming, fishing is the principle industry and a good number are employed at that business all along the shore. The principle fish companies here are A. & R. Loggie of Loggieville, who do business in salmon, fishing a good many salmon stands of their own and buying most all the salmon along the shore, the salmon are shipped from Grand Anse Station to their freezers in Dalhousie, N. B. Mr. McKinnon of Richibucto, is manager here; and W. S. Loggie of Chatham, N. B., runs two lobster factories, one in Pokeshaw and one in Stonehaven. They employ a good number of men. Jos. Poirier, M. P. P., does an extensive business in lobster: salmon and codfish, Nicholes Baldwin is also in the fish business; also James Degrace, F. J. Comeau, James Nixon and others. Fishing of all kinds is fairly good, salmon and lobsters were some better than former years.

The house and barn of P. J. Foley, ex collector of customs, Pokeshaw, were burned Monday morning. It is thought the fire was started by a child in the barn with matches, and as their were several tons of hay and straw in the barn it was quickly a mass of flames. The house and barn being joined by sheds the house was soon in flames, and though the neighbors gathered quickly nearly all the contents of the barn and house was consumed including a fine new bug y and a lot of genial proprietor of the Commercial. Boston, July 1.—Fire broke out at the Hoosac tunnel docks, Charlestown, just before 9 o'clock. An automatic signal was followed by three alarms from the city boxes as the flams spread. Within a few minutes of the first alarm piers 3, 4 and 5 were burning.
