There was an increase in the capital expenditure of \$713,269.

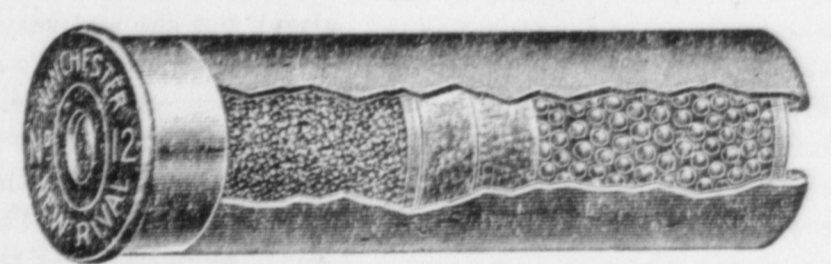
