MARITIME PROVINCE NOTES.

Sr. John, Dec. 5 - When the steam ship Baroda, Cant, Davies, sailed for South Africa, bay, at five o'clock Tuesday afternoon, she had on board five more per one than were entered on the ship's articles. Their names are Thomas and James Rogers, sons of Pilot B. Rogers; Thomas Doherty, son of Pilot Jeach Doherty, and Samuel Murray, son of James Murray, bestman. None of them are over sixteen years of age, and all were employed either at learning trades or were in stores. The boys, it seems, had made up their minds to see how matters looked around the seat of war in South Africa, so they determined to take French leave so far as the passage was concerned. Their parents, of course, were ignorant of their insentions, and feel badly over their going away. So far a can be learned the boys made no preparations regarding clothes. Tuesday morning they went to work as usual, and when some of them returned to dinner they were anxious to get the usual meal quickly, and as an excuse they told their mothers they were busy. One of the boys, dropped his tools in the place he was working and went aboard. Before Pilot Leahy left the vessel the carpenter told him he saw five boys getting aboard, and did not see them leave. A search was made, but no sign of the lads could be found on the ship. As the boys did not put in an appearance late last night, a search was made and then it was learned they had stowed away in the Baroda.

TRUKO, N. S., Dec. 5-Yesterday morning at East Mountain, Robert Campbell came home after a short absence in the lumber woods. In the meantime a most awful calamity had overtaken him, which removed three of the youngest of his children, Effiie, aged 16 years; Arthur, 11 years, and Myrtle, 7 years of age.

Mr. Campbell lost his wife several years since, and his eldest daughter had kept house for him and nurtured the two younger children since that time. There were older children in Mr. Campbell's family, but they had gone to other parts, one girl having married a gentleman named Reid. Fire of unexplained origin had consumed the dwelling house in which the remaining children slept, leaving nothing but smouldering ruins and the burned bodies. The dwelling was about five miles distant from East Mines Station. The first intimation of the disaster was observed by men on an Intercolonial train approaching Falleigh Lake station, at twenty minutes to seven o'clock. Shortly afterwards the neighbors brought word of the particulars, and before noon the stricken father had arrived. Only one explanation of the cause of the fire is given, to the effect that it had been the
