FATAL ACCIDENT.—The New Glasgow Chronicle of Thursday Dec. 5th, has the following account of the accident to Ernest Campbell, of Bass River, which occurred in the woods at Trafalgar, near Hopewell, N. S. The unfortunate man's name was Ernest Campbell, belonging to Bass River, Kent Co. He with a companion was cutting down a tree and young Campbell was struck on the head and when the tree was removed from him he was found to be seriously injured. A doctor was summoned from New Glasgow. It was found that the unfortunate young man was mortally injured, when told by the doctor that he could not live he begged "to see his dear mother." A telegram was sent and the mother who is a widow woman started from her home in Kent Co., but her son has passed away before her arrival. Deceased was 23 years old. His remains were brought to his old home for interment. The workmen in the camp presented the widow with \$50 and Mr. Crowe, superintendent of the company, presented her with \$100.

LAST WEDNESDAY'S STORM.—The snow storm of last week which set in on Tuesday night and continued until Wednesday night, was the worst experienced here, at this season of the year, for a number of years. About four feet of snow fell on the level, but it is piled up as high as five and six feet in places and none at all in other places. The very high wind that was blowing was the cause of this. The tide was also higher than at any time during the last few years and quite a lot of damage was done on that account. The public wharf, which was put in good shape last spring, has again been quite badly damaged, the arch being almost completely torn away. The ballast was also washed away from different parts of it. Several other small wharves were taken from their accustomed places and all were completely submerged with water. Messrs. J. & F. Jardine had a considerable amount of salt damaged, their warehouse being half full of water. They also suffered other losses. The telephone and telegraph wires were torn down both to the south and north of Richibucto by the high wind. The K. N. R. train did not venture out on Wednesday at all but succeeded in reaching Kent Junction in good time on Thursday.

DEATH OF A FORMER KENT COUNTY LADY.—The Lewiston, Me., Journal of Dec. 2, gives the following account of the death and burial of Mrs. Laura M. Smith, formerly a Miss Mundle, of Rexton:—The funeral of Mrs. Laura M. Smith was held at her late home, between here and Auburn, Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Rev. Mr. Danforth, pastor of the High street Congregational church, Auburn, officiated. The floral tributes were beautiful. The deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Mundle and was born in Rexton, Kent county, N. B., April 6, 1872. She was one of the family of four children. The deceased survived by a husband, Mr. Walter Smith, whom she married about nine years ago, three children, the oldest being about five years old, and the youngest two weeks, a father, a sister and one brother. One child died recently. Mrs. Smith died at 8 o'clock Friday morning after an illness of two weeks. She suffered much during her illness. The remains were placed in the tomb at Oak Hill cemetery, where they will remain until spring. The father of the deceased, Mr. Alexander Mundle arrived in Auburn Sunday morning. The sister of the deceased, Miss Bessie F. Mundle is also at the home of the deceased.

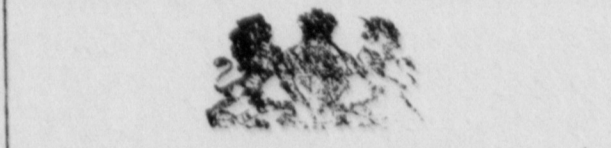

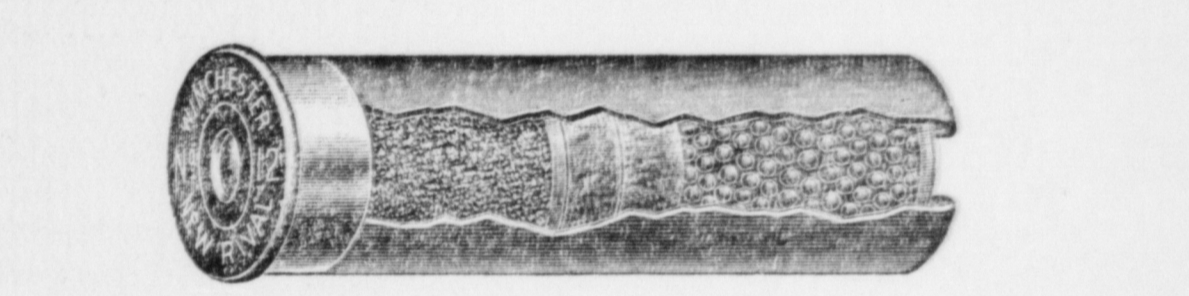
