DROWNING ACCIDENT.

TWO LIVES LOST AT OTTAWA, BOTH BODIES RECOVERED TO DAY.

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—The drowning accident in the Ottawa river here on Friday afternoon has cast a gloom over the entire community. Several ladies and gentlemen of the Government House set were on the ice and on the way home, when one party, consisting of Capt. Bell, A. D. C.; Vernon Nicholson; the Misses Ritchie, daughters of Lady Ritchie, and Miss Lemoine, broke through near Governor's Bay, but fortunately in shallow water, and all got out safely. Homeward bound, about 5 o'clock, were another party: A. N. Treadgold, mining engineer, of Dawson, and Miss Amy Blair, who were probably a quarter of a mile in the lead; Alex. Creelman, clerk in the Imperial Bank here (originally a Kent Co., N. B. man), and Miss Bessie Blair; and forty or fifty yards behind them Mr. H. A. Harper and Miss Snowball, daughter of Senator Snowball, of Chatham. The party had passed the head of Kettle Island, opposite Rockcliffe Park, when suddenly the skates of Mr. Creelman and Miss Bessie Blair stuck in thin, soft ice. They were both thrown forward violently and crashed headforemost into an air-hole. Mr. Creelman held on to Miss Blair and called out to Mr. Harper and Miss Snowball to "keep away for God's sake," and that they could do more good by keeping away. Harper, however, did not wait an instant. Telling Miss Snowball to skate to Gatineau Point for help, he threw off his coat and gauntlets and plunged into the water to the rescue. Creelman says that before Harper could reach them he (Creelman) made an effort to lift Miss Bessie on the ice, but with the weight of her soddened clothing could not succeed. Creelman sank in the attempt, and on rising found he was under the ice. He smashed it with his hands and clung to the thin sheet as best he could. Looking around he could not see a trace of either Harper or Miss Blair. Both had gone down. Meantime the screams and cries of Miss Snowball aroused people on Gatineau Point, and they were also heard by Miss Amy Blair and Mr. Treadgold.

Matthias Blais, who lives in a shack below the village, when he learned of the accident, pushed off in his punt to the scene of the accident, and there he found Creelman in the water clinging to the ice. Blais had just succeeded in getting Creelman into the boat when Treadgold skated up. They searched for the other two members of the party, but without any success and reluctantly had to leave the scene to convey to the shore Mr. Creelman, who was numbed with cold and almost unconscious after his immersion of twenty minutes.

The news of the death of Miss Bessie Blair was sent to Mr. and Mrs. Blair, who are at Clifton Springs.

The late Miss Blair was one of this season's debutantes and was in her 20th year. She had a bright, sunny disposition and was greatly beloved by her many friends. Mr. Harper was a son of the late Henry Harper, of Barrie, Ont., and was assistant editor of the Labor Gazette.

The bodies of Miss Blair and Mr. Harper were recovered to-day. They were found by a party who had been grappling for them since daylight, a little distance from where they went through the ice. The man who rescued Creelman (Matthias Blais) found the bodies.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 10.—The Fredericton Board of Trade had a special meeting this morning to consider the smallpox situation, and passed a resolution endorsing the recommendation of the Provincial Board of Health respecting the placing of a medical officer on all trains in and out of St. John, as well as on trains coming into New Brunswick from Quebec and Maine, for the purpose of examining all passengers and vaccinating all not already vaccinated.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—Lord Kitchener in a despatch from Pretoria dated Monday, Dec. 9, reports that the result of the week's work is 31 Boers killed, 17 wounded, 352 made prisoners, 35 surrendered and quantities of supplies captured. By advancing the line of blockhouses in the eastern part of the Transvaal Lord Kitchener is now able, for the first time to carry out systematic and continuous operations in the vicinity of Ermelo, Bethel and Carolina. Columns have cleared the south eastern districts of the Orange River Colony and are now operating northward of the Thaba N'Chu line.

The Boers are still in force in the extreme west of Cape Colony. They are there commanded by Maritz, who recently attacked Tontelboschkop. The Boers were driven off and Maritz was severely wounded.

DOMINION NEWS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—There will not be an increase in the number of men on the Canadian Mounted Rifles. There will be sent, however, over nine hundred horses. The steamships "Victorian" and "Manhattan" will carry the troops to South Africa. The men will be divided between the two ships; 472 horses will be sent by the former and 520 horses by the latter. The approval of the war office to the list of officers is expected in a day or two.

MONTREAL, Dec. 10.—Hangman Radecliff will arrive on Thursday morning to make arrangements for the execution of Leplaine, the convicted murderer, which takes place in the jail yard Friday morning.

Word has been received that His Excellency has approved of the report of the council that the law be allowed to take its course, and papers have been forwarded to Sheriff Thibeau. This will be the first execution in Montreal for nearly thirty years.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—James Martin and Charles Smith, two notorious safeblowers from the United States side of the line, were caught in Bryson & Graham's departmental store a few weeks ago, after bursting two safes with dynamite. They were waiting their trial in jail here. Early this morning Martin was caught in the corridor of the jail, after having sawn the door of his prison cell. How he got the saw is a mystery. A more crestfallen man than Martin when he was caught was never seen.

MONTREAL, Dec. 10.—A Barile was this morning sentenced by Justice Hall to life imprisonment for shooting Mrs. Bosco with intent to kill. Barile was an Italian whom Busco had befriended, and he made improper proposals to Mrs. Bosco in her husband's store on St. Lawrence street during her husband's absence. Incensed at her persistency in refusing her advances he shot her three times. Mrs. Bosco, after lingering some months, finally recovered and appeared in court and testified against Barile.

George Bissonette was sentenced to two months' imprisonment for causing the death of Contractor Dansereau in a street row some weeks ago.

Engineer Randall and Fireman Petruff were crushed to death beneath the locomotive. Three cars were wrecked. They went over the bank after the engine. Traffic was delayed for six hours.
