THE WORLD OVER.

MOBILE, Ala., Dec. 5.—The investigation into the killing of Steward Jeffreys by Canada C. M. Morris, of the British barque, Brian Wood, on November 18, while the vessel was en route to Mobile, and the subsequent suicide of Captain Morris, has resulted in a confirmation of the latter story of the tragedy.

London, Dec. 5.—Sir William MacCormac, Bart, president of the Royal College of Surgeons, died at Bath yesterday morning. He was born in 1836.

Sir William MacCormac was born in Belfast in 1836, and was the eldest son of Dr. Henry MacCormac. He was educated at Belfast, Dublin, and Paris, was surgeon to the Anglo-American ambulance in 1870, and was present at the battle of Sedan. Sir William was consulting surgeon to St. Thomas's Hospital, London; was appointed surgeon-in-ordinary to the Prince of Wales in 1887, was an officer of the French Legion of Honour, and professor of several other foreign decorations.
