As the season approaches for the commemoration of the greatest birthday in the world's calendar, many thoughts come crowding in of that lowly manger in Bethlehem which unlike other places in the far distant past has not been observed by the two thousand years which separates us from our vision, but has rather been gilded and glorified by the songs of praise and rejoicing which throughout the centuries have been poured out by the host of witnesses for the deliverance from the bonds of death which was betokened by that new life in the Judean manger.

The spirit of Christmas past, present and future urges us as it did the poor, old, shrivelled soul of Scrooge, in Charles Dickens, delightful Christmas tale, to forget how far we may have forgotten the sweet influences of babyhood, and to keep fresh our hearts with the joy of making glad the children whose lives are bound up in our guidance.

A COWARDLY ATTACK.

The attempt which a number of our newspaper contemporaries are making to represent THE REVIEW as having made a malicious attack on a sacred function of the Roman Catholic church is unworthy of those journals. As THE REVIEW hastened to explain in the very first issue after the appearance of the article in question, the insertion of the article was a mistake pure and simple.

THE REVIEW explained the mistake and apologized for the oversight which made possible the republication of the offensive item, but some of our newspaper contemporaries have been sufficiently cowardly to overlook the explanation and apology, and have commented on THE REVIEW's action as though it had made a malicious and uncalled for attack on the religious beliefs of the Catholic people.

These gentlemen contested York at the general election in November, 1900, Mr. Gibson being elected by some 74 majority.

Gibson, the lumber and cotton King. Mr. Phinney has taken the stump in Mr. Gibson's behalf and his many friends in Kent will rejoice to know that he is taking the same prominent place in York County which he has enjoyed in the legal, commercial and political life of Kent.

THE REVIEW congratulates Mr. Gibson on the able support of Mr. Phinney and has no doubt of his success on the 28th inst.

ADDITIONAL CANADIAN SQUAD-RONS.

THE WAR OFFICE HAS CABLED ACCEPTANCE OF THE OFFER.

OTTAWA, Dec. 15.—The Dominion government has received a wire from the war office accepting their offer of two additional squadrons of Canadian mounted rifles. This will make a contingent of about 900 instead of 600 men.

The following order was given out to the press: "In consequence of accommodation being available on the transport, two additional squadrons of mounted rifles will be raised for service in South Africa.
