C. P. R. WRECK.

ST. JOHN, Dec. 16.—As a result of washouts along the lines of the Maine Central and C. P. Railways yesterday both lines are hung up and one man has lost his life.

The accident which terminated fatally occurred near Brownville Junction and by engine No. 713 going through a culvert, Fireman Patton was killed and Engineer Rusby and Pilot Esrey severely injured. Patton belonged to Farham, Que.

The washouts caused by the rain are very serious in their nature and will greatly interfere with traffic until the damage is repaired.

The downpour of rain began about 6 o'clock Saturday evening and as there was about six feet of snow on the ground, things soon assumed a serious aspect. Water soon covered the tracks and bridges and the culverts overflowed, washing out the roadbed in places to a length of nearly 100 feet.

Washouts have also occurred on the Maine Central between Brunswick and Bangor, and the Bangor and Aroostook has also suffered near Greenville.

Superintendent Osborne was advised of the condition of affairs by wire and in company with Engineer Barbour left this morning with a repair train and crew to rush along the repairs to the damaged roadway.

The Atlantic express which left Montreal Saturday night is held at Megantic. The work of clearing the road is going forward to-day and it is hoped that by tomorrow traffic may be resumed. Fortunately a great deal of winter Port export freight is on this side of the washout and as there are no steamers at the West side, though two are due, the washout will not seriously interfere with the business at Sand Point.
