WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

SIGNALS RECEIVED AT ST. JOHN'S, N. F., FROM CORNWALL, ENG.

St. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 14.—Signor Marconi informs a correspondent of the Associated Press that he has received wireless messages from a station in Cornwall, England, solving the problem of signalling across the Atlantic Ocean without wires.

Signor Marconi announced to-night the most wonderful scientific experiment of modern times, in stating that he had received electric signals across the Atlantic ocean from his station in Cornwall, England. He says that before leaving England he had made his plans for accomplishment of this result, while his primary object was the communication with ocean liners in mid-ocean he also hoped to succeed in attaining the wonderful scientific achievement of wireless telegraphy across the Atlantic.

Signor Marconi's station in Cornwall is most powerful. He possesses an electric force generated there 100 times greater than at his ordinary stations. Before he left England he arranged with the electricians in charge of the station which is located at Poldhu, to begin sending signals daily after a certain date, which Signor Marconi would cable him upon perfecting his arrangements here. Signor Marconi arrived here a week ago Friday and selected Signal Hill, at the entrance to the harbor as an experimenting station and moved his equipment there.

Last Monday he cabled Poldhu station to begin sending signals at 3 p. m. daily and to continue until 6 p. m. These hours being respectively 11.30 a. m. to 2.30 p. m., St. John's time. During these hours on Wednesday Signor Marconi elevated a kite, with an aerial wire by means of which signals are sent or received. He remained at the recorder attached to the receiving apparatus and to his profound satisfaction signals were received by him at intervals, according to the programme arranged previously with the operator at Poldhu.

Its development is demonstrated by the success of the present experiments with the incompleteness and imperfect apparatus, as the signals can be received only by the most sensitively adjusted apparatus and Signor Marconi is working under great difficulties, owing to the conditions prevailing here. The Cornwall coast is 1,700 miles from St. John's.

In view of the success attending these trials, Signor Marconi will for the present disregard the matter of communication with trans Atlantic steamers. He will return to England next week and will conduct the experiments from Poldhu himself. He expects that the greater electrical power there will enable him to send more effective signals. He will undertake this work himself, leaving assistants here to erect a mast, and receive the signals as he forwards them. It is not possible to send return signals from here until a powerful electrical battery shall have been installed.

Sir Robert Bond, premier of Newfoundland, offers Signor Marconi every facility within the power of the colonial government for the carrying out of his plans.

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—A special to the Herald from Orange, N. J., says:

Thomas A. Edison doubts the reliability and accuracy of the published statements that Marconi has received a wireless message across the ocean. The celebrated inventor was seen in Llewellyn park this evening.

"I doubt this story," said Mr. Edison, "I don't believe it."
"Do you think Marconi was deceived because the letter, which is alleged, he received was the one which he had instructed should be sent him?" was asked.
"Oh, no," replied Mr. Edison. "I don't believe he was deceived, but I doubt the story. The letter 'S' with the three dots is a very simple one, but I have been fooled myself. Until the published reports are verified I shall doubt the accuracy of the account."

DIES ON STEAMER GARTH CASTLE

HALIFAX, Dec. 15.—The Elder-Dempster liner Garth Castle, Captain Frank Carley, which left Liverpool 48 hours ahead of the mail steamer Corinthian, now hourly expected, arrived here at 8 o'clock Saturday night, after a stormy passage, gales and head seas prevailing for the first six days, after which the weather moderated. The ship was swept by many seas, but not damaged. She brought 520 passengers, of whom 72 landed here, 448 proceeded to St. John in the steamer.

She landed 30 tons cargo here and has about 1,000 for St. John.

On December 9, an Italian steamer passenger, Dominico Bellaniso, died from heart failure and his body was consigned to the deep the same day. The captain read the burial service.

The same morning in lat. 53.52, lon. 30.20, the Garth Castle sighted an oil tank steamer rolling about helplessly in the heavy sea with signals of distress displayed. Captain Carley bore down to her and found her to be the Swanee, of the Anglo-American line. It was too rough to launch a boat, but she signalled she had lost her propeller. The Garth Castle offered to stand by till the weather moderated and tow to Halifax, but the disabled ship declined, stating she preferred to wait for a steamer bound east to tow.

On arriving here a child in the steerage was found to have scarlet fever and the family was removed to Lawlor's Island and the steamer was fumigated. This caused delay in her sailing. She did not get away till 8 o'clock this morning.

SHOOTING FATALITY.

The Charlottetown Patriot says:—"On Sunday evening a terrible and shocking accident occurred at Lower Montague, the second fatality of the kind in this province within the last three weeks. On Saturday afternoon Lawrence Kiley, of French Creek, left his home alone to go rabbit shooting. His mother filled with a strange presentiment of coming home vainly tried to persuade him not to go, telling him she feared an accident. When night arrived, and he had not returned she became uneasy and alarmed the neighbors. A searching party was organized, and men scoured the woods with lanterns, but in vain.

About seven o'clock on Sunday morning the searchers were horrified to find the lifeless remains in the woods on George Wright's farm, about a mile from home. A dog belonging to John Jeffrey warned the party by barking at the discovery. The body was face upwards with the empty gun, an old-fashioned single muzzle loader, and four rabbits deceased had shot, lying close at hand. One side of the head was completely blown away, and every particle of clothing, except a portion of underclothing on the back had been burnt off, down to the top of the boots. The flesh was a charred mass, burned in some places half an inch deep and the features disfigured beyond semblance of human shape.

There were no marks of a struggle and death was certainly instantaneous.

It is thought that he had aimed at game and that the gun hung fire. Resting the butt on the ground with the muzzle towards his face, he had felt in his pocket for a cap, when the gun was discharged the lead passing through his neck and face. The bent fingers as if in the attitude of placing a new cap on the gun, added color to the theory. The paper wadding set fire to the clothing, and the explosion of the powder flask in his pocket aided in the terrible work of combustion.

The fact that the body was found near the edge of the woods, about ten yards from a field and that four rabbits had been shot, goes to show that Kiley was on his way home when death came in so horrible a form. About sundown parties living in the vicinity heard the two reports but thought nothing of it, as shooting had been going on continually in that locality during the season. The remains were conveyed to one of the houses near by and it was thought best to spare the grief-stricken mother a look at her boy. Deceased was 30 years and was a steady young man.
