Miss Nellie Humphrey spent part of last week in St. John.

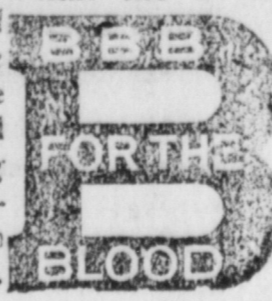

FAREWELL ADDRESS

TO GEO. V. MCINERNEY ON THE EVE OF HIS DEPARTURE FOR ST. JOHN.

Last Thursday evening the Temperance Hall was almost crowded to the doors with the citizens of Richibucto, and also several from Rexton, to bid farewell to Geo. V. McInerney on the eve of his departure for the city of St. John, where he will reside in future. At 8 o'clock Mr. Robert Hutchinson was called upon to take the chair, and on the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. McInerney, a few minutes later, the audience rose and joined in singing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow."

The chairman, Mr. Hutchinson, then made a few preliminary remarks after which he asked Mr. W. D. Carter to read the following address, during the reading of which Mr. Fred Ferguson unveiled a handsome walnut book-case:

To G. V. McInerney, Esq., K. C.:

The citizens of the Town of Richibucto, having learned that you have decided to sever your connection with Kent and remove with your family to the City of St. John, feel they cannot permit such an event to pass without conveying to you some expression (however inadequate) of the esteem in which you are held by all classes of this community, in which you have spent so many years of a very valuable and interesting portion of your life. Although a native of Kingston, now Rexton, your student's life, your marital and your professional life has been spent in the Town of Richibucto and you have consequently become more identified with its people personally, socially and professionally than with the people of Rexton, your native place. We are convinced we correctly represent the feeling of regret that pervades this entire community at your separation from it.

That some testimonial, however inadequate it may be in one sense, yet appropriate to your profession, should be presented to you before your departure, was suggested by admiring friends and in behalf of the citizens of Richibucto we present you with this book-case, believing that when you daily enter your office you will necessarily look upon it, and when taking books from it your memory will revert in association to that place in which you have lived happily for so long a period of your life, and that you will live over again among its people many of the exciting scenes through which you have passed. As this address is non-partisan we do not desire to make any detailed reference to the high positions you have held and the distinction you have acquired, for that is written in the pages of Canada's history. We are, however, at liberty to refer to your invariable courtesy to all in with whom you have come in contact, whether in business or socially, and the result has been that you have deservedly won the esteem and confidence of all. We sincerely hope, and we are assured we express the true sentiments of all, when we say we earnestly trust you will find in your new home many true, warm and admiring friends, and that you, Mrs. McInerney and family may be blessed with health and enjoy all the prosperity, happiness and peace that you can possibly desire or participate for many long years to come. Mr. McInerney very feelingly and ably replied, and in doing so reviewed his twenty-four years' residence in Richibucto.

Appropriate speeches were then made by Rev. D. Fraser, of Rexton; Mr. James McQueen, barrister of Shediac; Rev. H. R. Baker, W. D. Carter, Geo. S. Sayre, Dr. T. J. Bourque, Rev. H. A. Monk and Robert Hutchinson. Mr. B. E. Johnson presided at the piano and the meeting closed by singing "Auld Lang Syne," "God Save the King," and three cheers and a tiger for Geo. V. McInerney.

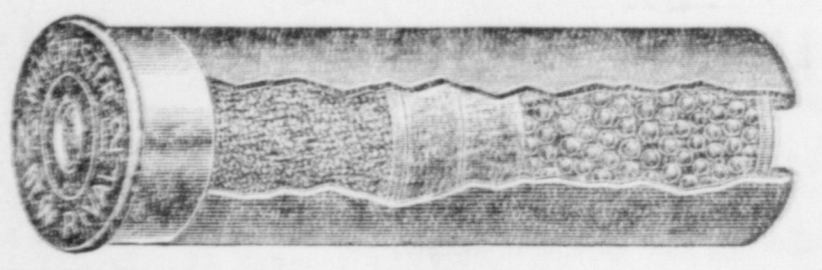
