

THE EDUCATIONAL FEATURES.
The illustrated lectures attracted the interest of every one. Although quite extensive seating capacity had been provided, the seats were constantly filled and hundreds were standing about the ring five and six deep. The intense interest manifested by all the visitors was most gratifying to the management.

The Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Sydney Fisher, expressed himself as highly pleased with the aspect of the Show, as well as its general excellence, and Mr. F. W. Hodson, the Live Stock Commissioner, said the way in which the people appreciated the efforts made to give them good practical lessons amply repaid all the efforts and expenditure of the Department of Agriculture. The representatives of the Maritime Provincial Governments who were present also expressed their pleasure at the work, and promised increased assistance for the coming year.

THE EVENING CONVENTIONS.
Although every hour of daylight was occupied with an interesting programme, the visitors' interest did not cease, and the meetings in the Opera House and the Parish Hall were attended to the full capacity of the Halls, and the first evening so full was the Opera House that over 200 people were turned away. Hon. Sydney Fisher was the principal speaker at the meeting and he dwelt specially upon the importance of education for Agriculture strongly urging the value of educational exhibitions such as the present Show, and pledged his Department to do all it legitimately could to encourage an annual Maritime Winter Fair. He warmly commended the idea of an Agricultural College for the Maritime Provinces.

Hon. L. P. Farris speaking for his Department pledged his support to the continuance of such a Show, and warmly commended its influence as an educational medium. New Brunswick was well known as an Agricultural Province, and anything that helped agriculture, specially helped her people.

Hon. J. W. Longley and T. R. Black speaking for Nova Scotia, both upheld the value of exhibitions as educators in agriculture. They showed the wonderful resources of Nova Scotia in her mines, fisheries, forests and her soil. Her many industrial interests gave her farmers an excellent home market.

Dr. Jas. Hills, President of the Ontario College, gave what was acknowledged to be one of the ablest addresses ever delivered upon practical education in the Maritime Provinces. He proved by many examples the value of special technical education in opening a man's pathway to success. Our Colleges to-day, he said, were only educating 10 per cent of the population. What about the 90 per cent? Instead of having half a dozen Universities in the Maritime Provinces, there should be one good University, and thoroughly

God help Agriculture without education; it would sink down lower and lower, but with proper education it will rank as the noblest profession in the land.

Hon. Wm. Ross of Cape Breton, was also among the interesting and practical speakers, as were H. J. Logan, M. P., for Cumberland; Hon. B. Rogers, Commissioner of Agriculture for P. E. Island; F. W. Hodson, Dominion Live Stock Commissioner; Thos. A. Peters, Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture for New Brunswick; B. W. Chipman, Sec'y for Agriculture of Nova Scotia; G. C. Creelman, Supt. of Ontario Farmers' Institutes.

We regret that we cannot here give a report of all these excellent addresses, and those of other speakers whose names are not mentioned. As a display of Fat Stock and Poultry, and as a great educational Convention, the Maritime Winter Fair far exceeded the hopes of its promoters. Already arrangements are being made for a large and better Winter Fair next year.
