The taverns alone had their windows painted and curtained and a wooden screen before the door so as to prevent any person from the outside seeing what was going on within.

Why do they not exhibit the manufactured article in the window and the process going on inside? It can only be because they are ashamed of their nefarious work. In some places the law requires the removal of all these screens and curtains. We hope that the License Commissioners will insist on this being done in Toronto. If it be right, as they claim, for people to drink in these saloons, why conceal the fact of their doing so? If they are ashamed of it, it must be because they feel that the thing is wrong. The license-issuing power ought not to be a party to surrounding with concealment this pernicious business. By all means take away the screens.

We hope the Inspectors, and Commissioners, too, will see that these places furnish the entertainment for man and beast required by law. A friend of the writer's during the temporary absence of his family from home, went to several inns for meals and accommodation, and when these could not be furnished, reported to the Commissioners. But why should a private individual thus have to play detective, and what sort of business is it that needs to be watched and compelled to fulfil the requirements of the law? The liquor business is everywhere—under high license, low license, and no license, as well as under prohibition—the same defiant, lawless thing, creeping, sneaking, evading or defying the rules made for its regulation. The only rational thing is to exterminate it utterly.

St. John Sun, Nov. 22: Last night, in the Central police station building Coroner D. E. Barryman, with a jury held an inquiry into the death of the six-year-old daughter of Oscar Canston, which occurred on Wednesday from lockjaw, following vaccination.

After hearing the evidence of Mrs. Canston, mother of the dead child, Mr. Hawker, druggist, who performed the vaccination, Dr. H. G. Addy and his son, Dr. G. A. B. Addy, who attended the patient after she developed symptoms of tetanus, was taken, the jury rendered this verdict: "We find that the child died of tetanus, caused by the use of impure vaccine. ### DOMINION NEWS.

For some years past a few seizing officers in connection with the customs department, Ottawa, have been endeavoring to seize engine and cars built by the Canadian Atlantic Railway in the United States for entering Canada without paying duty. The cars were used for international traffic and the customs department exempted them from duty. It is said that three of these cars belonging to the National Car Co., of St. Albans, were only released a few days ago. No duty was paid.

Charles M. Hayes has resumed the management of the Grand Trunk Railway with the title of second vice-president.

The following is ordered: "No person shall dig mussel mud within 200 yards from any live oyster bed, and then only at such place or places as may be prescribed in writing by a fishery officer."

The Toronto Board of Trade have passed resolutions asking the government to withdraw the recent instruction to weights and measures inspectors that only bushel measure is to be legal for testing grain, believing the present two quart measure satisfactory and asking the government to appoint official weighers at all public elevators, especially at Montreal, Toronto, Portland and St. John.

The Grand Trunk and C. P. R. have decided upon general vaccination of all employees in Quebec province, including train hands, shopmen and clerks.

Fifteen thousand tons of hay is being shipped to South Africa for the war office in November and in December 15,000 tons more and about 600,000 bushels of oats will be despatched. In December 15 vessels will be loaded at St. John for South Africa.

Hon. Mr. Borden says the logical outcome of the recent correspondence with the home authorities would be that Canada's offer of a third contingent would be accepted. In that event the force would consist of 600 men, thoroughly equipped by Canada, commanded by a Canadian officer.

The Irish M. P.'s have left Ottawa for Chicago.
