ANOTHER OLD LAND MARK GONE.—We have again this week to record the death of another of the old residents of Richibucto, in the person of John Graham, who died on Tuesday morning about seven o'clock. Deceased was born in England in the year 1824, and came to Richibucto when a boy of six years. He has always followed the profession of a farmer until late years, having been obliged to give up on account of ill health, and was looked upon as one of the best farmers in the county. He was very successful in life and at one time owned a large amount of property, not only in the town, but in other parts of the county. Mr. Graham was well liked by all who knew him, and although he has not been around among his friends and neighbors for some time, he will be much missed in the community. His wife—Miss Fairman—died some years ago. He leaves a family of six children—4 sons and 2 daughters. The sons are George, of Bay Islands, Newfoundland; Frank E., of Wellington, Mass., and James and John, of Richibucto. The daughters are Mrs. Wm. Ross, with whom he has lived, and Mrs. Peter Barnard, of Richibucto. He also has one brother living in Cobden, Ontario. The funeral will take place this (Thursday) afternoon on the arrival of the train.

—What might have been quite a serious fire occurred at the K. N. R. depot on Saturday morning. Just after the train had left for Kent Junction, Mr. J. C. —The New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company have had a number of meetings here during the past few days for the consideration of matters in connection with the extension of the Central railway from Chipman to the Newcastle coal fields. The company accepted the tender of James Barnes, M. P. P. for Kent, for the building of this fifteen miles of railway. It is expected the extension will be completed early in January. Mr. Barnes has already begun to order materials and 300 men will be put on the work as soon as they can be obtained. Mr. Barnes proposes to sublet portions of the work in order to have it completed in the specified time.—St. John Sun. —At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Maritime Stock Breeders Association at Amherst last Friday evening, at which the Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, Mr. Hodson, was present, it was decided to hold the Maritime Winter Fair, combining a fat stock show, block test, dairy test and poultry show, at Amherst on the 17th, 18th and 19th of December. Over \$2,000 will be offered in prizes. The prize list, somewhat revised and added to since its first publication will shortly be republished. Every evening during the show the Maritime Breeders Association will hold a public meeting in the Town Hall when the best Live Stock authorities on the continent will give addresses. The annual business meeting of the Association will be held on Thursday morning. The lectures on the beef and pork carcasses and poultry will be given on Thursday afternoon, and the show will close at 10.30 p. m. that night. Meat dealers are invited to write W. W. Hubbard, Secretary Maritime Breeders Association, Halifax, as to the number of fat cattle, etc., to be offered at the show before arranging to send out side the produce for their Christmas beef.
