THAT ASSAULT CASE.—About three weeks ago a boy named Frigo, son of Chris. Frigo, St. Louis, Kent county, died at his home after several days' illness. It was alleged the boy's death was hastened by an assault upon him by a boy in the neighborhood—a son of Frank Robichaud. The body was taken from the grave and an inquest held, when the jury returned a verdict to the effect that Frigo's death was hastened by an assault made on him by Robichaud. Dr. Bourque held a post-mortem, but the body was badly decomposed, which made the examination very unsatisfactory. Dr. Bourque testified at the examination before Stipendiary R. H. Davis last Thursday, that he was called to see the boy. He found him in a critical condition, and diagnosed his case as heart trouble. He saw no marks on the boy indicating violence, and heard nothing from the family in reference to the boy being assaulted. On his second visit a few days later he found the boy in the same critical condition, the same symptoms being present in a more aggravated form. During this visit he was informed by the family that the boy had been assaulted. A number of other witnesses were examined, and the court adjourned until Tuesday. On Tuesday the case was continued and several more witnesses examined. After summing up the evidence taken on both occasions, Stipendiary Davis committed Robichaud for trial at the next term of the Kent County Court.

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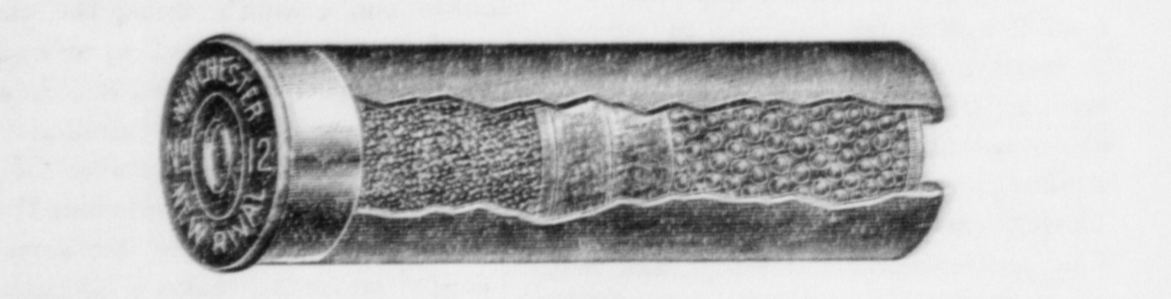
