Putolus noveboracensis, as the scientist calls the weasel or ermine, ranges from North Carolina away up into Canada. It is rare, however, to take ermine or white coated weasels in Pennsylvania, although two specimens have just been received at the Academy of Natural Sciences from Sullivan county. In fact, south of Pennsylvania the weasel never changes color in winter, and this fact goes far to substantiate the theory of protective coloration. Thus was the scene of a terrible tragedy early when snow covers the ground the white ermine becomes nearly invisible, while in his weasel's guise during the summer he is not nearly so conspicuous as he would be did he wear his white coat all the year round.

Another interesting fact is that while the animals that live in the north always change color those in the south do not, the reason being that their white color would not protect, but destroy, them, as there is almost no snow in the south.

Stock Judging.


"One of the newest and at the same time most popular courses at the University of Illinois," says the Chicage Tribune, "is that in stock judging. It has been established only three years. and there are at present more than 300 students taking it. The course is popular because it leads directly to employ. ment at much more than average sala ries, some of the graduates after taking a course of nine months' duration securing places as cattle buyers at the stockyards and elsewhere at salaries ranging from \$2,000 to \$3,000 a year.

"So great is the interest which has been aroused in cattle judging that a number of western colleges have formed an intercollegiate stock judging league and send rival teams to annual contests. the winners being awarded a handsome silver trophy presented by J. A. Spoor of Chicago. The course of instruction at the University of Illinois is entirely practical. No books are used, the demonstration being made on the living animals. Once the students have the good and bad points of the different classes of animals firmly fixed in their minds they are set to judging five or six animals in the same ring,"

Treatment of Burns.

Burns may be ordinary, but they lose none of their smart because of the ease with which they are acquired. Some persons seem to have a perfect genius for getting burned. If they strike a match, it breaks and scorches them, while a visit to the kitchen ends in a burn from the oven or a scald from hot water or steam. Of course the right thing to do with a burn is to get it away from all contact with the air and

to do this with all possible haste. The necessary articles for the treatment should be on hand, and they are baking soda-not washing soda, notice -fresh fat of some sort and several thicknesses of cotton cloth. It is an excellent plan to have a bottle of carren oil ready for such emergencies. Carron oil is made by shaking together equal parts of linseed oil and limewater. If the skin is broken over the burn, use the oil without the soda. Otherwise moisten the soda with olive oil or sweet oil or even lard or cold cream and apply it. Over this wrap the cloth. Cotton batting is often used for covering the burn and keeping out the air, but it is not to be recommended. It is not a good plan to use flour, dusting it over a burn, for it frequently hardens and is of little comfort. One of the simplest measures for a superficial burn is to apply the white of an egg with a soft piece of old muslin, adding more as it dries.


