THE LATE ALLAN M. SMITH.—The Acadian Recorder, of Halifax, dated Oct. 11, has the following to say about the late Allan M. Smith:—During the present year a number of our most prominent residents have passed away, and to-day we have to record the demise of one of the most popular of our younger citizens, Allan M. Smith, accountant for the Royal Bank of Canada, whose death occurred last evening. The news of his demise was not unexpected, as he had been ill for some months, but at the same time is received with the greatest sadness by his multitude of friends. The deceased, who was a native of Rexton, N. B., entered the service of the Royal Bank 15 years ago, and for the past seven years has been in the Halifax office, and by his obliging and genial manner, as well as business ability, made him popular with all he came in contact in the bank. He was an ardent lover of music, was prominently associated with the Symphony Orchestra and Hispania Club, and had taken part in a number of amateur performances; he was also a member of the Wanderers and the Red Cap Snow Shoe Club, and in all these organizations was one of the most esteemed members. His loss will be keenly felt by his friends, who were legion, as "Allie" (as he was familiarly called) had no enemies; he was upright, good-hearted, and possessed of the most genial manner, and a thorough worker either in business or in any organization with which he was connected. The deceased was two months short of 30 years of age; he was a son of the late Albert T. Smith of Rexton, and leaves two sisters, Mrs. I. B. Oakes, of Wolfville, and Mrs. Edward Todd, of St. Stephen, N. B., and four brothers. One of these was navigating officer on the steamship Lucrecia and is now in Liverpool. His other brothers are resident at different places in the New England States.
