THE RACES.

STATEMENT OF LIGHT COMMIT-TEE.

The trotting races held on the Rexton Driving the on Thursday last was well attended, Towards of 500 people being present from all parts of the county. The day was fine with a cool westerly wind blowing, and everybody watched the races with interest. The 2 40 race was the first called in which tour horses competed, namely, Jock, Mand H., Little Dick and Black Morris. This race was very hotly contested, Jock taking first money, Maud H. second and Little Dick third. The race would probably have been somewhat different had not an accident happened to Little Dick in the first heat. The race was pretty close between the latter horse owned by Dr. F. W. Tozer, Rexton, and Maud H., owned by Geo. Hopkins, Springhill, until the 3 pole was reached. Here Little Dick sprained his leg which prevented him from keeping up his speed. He, however, trotted the other two heats in a very lame condition, winning third money.

The green race was still more exciting and more closely contested. Five horses took part in this race, namely, Royal Prince, Doubtful, Peter the Great, Prince and Sunrise. Peter the Great won first money in three straight heats. Royal Prince, Prince and Doubtful tied and the balance of the purse was divided. The trotting was very fast, the best time being 2.38.

There was also a match race between Robert Wood, owned by P. Melanson, Shediac, and Levi H., owned by J. Robertson, Bathurst, for a purse of \$36.00. Levi H. won in three straight heats. Following is a summary of the races:

There is not a farmer in the county of Kent but would find a profit in keeping sheep, if the Act of Assembly passed on the 20th of March, 1896 was put in force. This Act provides that a tax of \$1.00 shall be levied on every male dog, and \$5.00 on every female dog, unless fifteen free-holders from each parish have caused by petition a by law to be passed by the

Municipal Council exempting taxation outside of one male dog to each householder. This Act seems very liberal to persons

wishing to keep one male dog, and if enforced would certainly be some protection to farmers who wish to prosecute a legitimate calling and also provide a fund for losses by depredation of dogs.


Had our Council obeyed the require. ments of this law, there would now be a fund of several hundred dollars to must the many losses of sheep by dogs, lately

sustained, and no doubt many useless curs would be dispensed with, while the Monday, Sept. 2nd. Parents who intend only dogs kept would be those of some special value and worth the tax levied. As the Council has neglected to enforce school on the opening day, so that the the law, parties who have suffered loss by

> the aepredation of dogs killing their sheep, can now only demand two thirds of the

loss sustained, and if refused payment, will be compelled to get a mandamus from the Supreme Court to compel them to execute the provisions of the law and await the collection of a sufficient dog tax to meet their losses, or two-thirds of it. In the mean time farmers, for their own protection, had better combine and decide which is of the most benefit for the county-dogs or sheep.

THE DEATH OF MR, EPHRIAM PETERS.

Mr. Epnriam Peters, of the Record Foundry & Machine Co., passed away Tuesday night at Boston, Mass., after a short illness. The news came as a pain. ful shock to his relatives and hosts of friends. He had been troubled with an affection of the ear recently and acting on local advice he went to Boston on Monday week. An operation was performed and a quantity of pus removed from the inner ear. This gave relief and he was improved very much. He was apparently in good spirits and physically almost well. Tuesday morning a telegram was received by Mrs. Peters here stating that her husband was dangerously ill and to come at once. Mrs. Peters, Mr. A. E. Peters and his sister Mi-s Annie, left for Boston by the C. P. R. express. A few minutes before they left another telegram was received intimating that Mr. Peters was dangerously ill with no hope of recovery and later information states that on Monday afternoon he suddenly fell in a faint or unconscious condition which was a probable result of the ear trouble. In his fall he fractured his skull, and as a consequence death came.

The deceased was born in Kingston, Kent County, in 1865, and was about 36 years of age. He was the youngest son of Skaphen and Martha Peters, and his






