The party in dominion politics, the Star supports, was very much less guilty, indeed we might say it was more generous, in this respect, and yet, strange to say, the Star appears to be the only paper which presses forward in the defence of the dominion government.

EVENTS OF THE WEEK.
(St John Freeman, Aug. 10.)

The Telegraph during the week bawled out in an editorial, and again screamed in editorials against the Common Council referring the Napier-Campbell matter to the Safety Board, ostensibly so that the discipline of the force might be preserved. Regardless of this supreme effort on the part of the writer, the Common Council unblushingly referred the matter. Then the Telegraph, as if by inspiration, wrote another editorial in the matter under the caption "The Police Investigation." This editorial had about as much to do with the investigation, as had another editorial in the same issue on "An Unwarranted Faith."

It would appear as though some funny fellow had been making a visit to the editors sactum. It explains tremulously that there is a risk about its being courageous enough to take "everybody from the City fathers to the men on the street corners" into its confidence and give "the real reason for disagreements on the force." It also fears some one may apply to it the quotation "that fools rush in where angels fear to tread. Why should the present staff of editors have any fear like that? There was a time in this city when we heard a great deal about the "silly Telegraph" but the paper has changed so, since that time. Nobody thinks now-a-days about wasting printers ink in so characterizing it. The Telegraph speaks for itself. He that runs may read, and he who reads the Telegraph—Knows.

Our esteemed evening contemporary in Monday's issue said "The Star is of opinion that the question of sect or church should not be considered or discussed in connection with any public office."

It is because it has been considered and discussed, that we object; particularly as the result of such discussions means the ignoring of persons belonging to a particular church. We confess we thought the Star would be the last paper which would undertake to defend the Common Council the provincial government, or the Dominion Cabinet, who are the offenders in the respect we pointed out last week, it admits what we said about the Customs, the Post Office, etc. is quite true but rather questions whether we can prove there was discrimination when the officials we named were appointed. It says they were not appointed because they were Protestants. We say they were appointed, and they were appointed, and they are not Catholics. One assertion is as cogent and about as good proof as the other. We state applicants for office have discovered that the question of their belonging to a particular church, is made a great objection to their securing provincial positions. This should not be so, and this we decidedly and emphatically object to. In the Common Council there is one Catholic, and fifteen Protestants. Does not the Star know of persons who have been dropped off the list, not because of their want of ability but for some other reason? Then in provincial matters: Why was it that the M. P. P. who resides in the North End vigorously opposed the appointment of a well known supporter of the local government, as issuer of marriage licenses? It was not that he was not fit for the exact position, but because of his religion it was plainly said he ought not to get it. Illustrations, too numerous can be given to prove that a man's religion is brought into the discussion to prevent his securing office and this is the matter of which we really complain. Nobody ever thought of asserting anything so silly as that a man ought to get office simply because he was of this sect or that church; but what we do assert, is, that no man ought to be refused, what he is entitled to by his ability and his loyalty to party, simply because he is a Catholic or a Protestant. We trust no one is such a nitwit, as to think that because a man is a Catholic or a Protestant, that therefore such circumstance, or such belief will "make him a better official than his natural and acquired mental powers enable him to be."

What we repeat is, Catholics are one third of the population. They pay their taxes, and the Common Council ignores them. We say they very largely support

TELEGRAPH AND FREEMAN.

SOME STATEMENTS IN WHICH THE POLITICAL REPUTATION OF HON. R. J. RITCHIE IS CONCERNED.

A PECULIAR INCIDENT.
(Edtl. St. John Telegraph, 13th.)

The St. John Freeman has given vent to many strange productions, but we venture to say none more peculiar than the article of last Saturday under the general title of "Events of the Week." The author of the article, we understand, was Police Magistrate Ritchie, who, under the guise of one of the Freeman's regular staff, gives vent to his spite against the Telegraph, the local and dominion governments. This is not the first anonymous contribution of Police Magistrate Ritchie to the Freeman. But Saturday's offence is particularly flagrant for the reason that the subject under discussion is the police troubles, and the police magistrate uses the columns to make a special plea in his own behalf, which might readily deceive the readers of that paper, who would never expect to find the city's police magistrate appearing as an anonymous special newspaper pleader. We mistake the better feeling of all classes in this community, whether Catholic or Protestant, conservative or liberal, if any sympathy can be found for this species of Indian warfare. No greater injury could be done the claim for equal civic and political rights than has been inflicted upon that cause by the treachery and black hearted ingratitude evidenced in the article to which reference is made.

But, apart even from the evidence of baseness displayed, we have yet to learn that a public servant enjoying one of the most lucrative positions in the gift of the local government, has the right to devote the time, which might with advantage be displayed in his official duties, in masquerading as an anonymous penny-a-liner. There is plenty of unfinished business in Police Magistrate Ritchie's court to use up his surplus energy. For example, the case of young Manson is still awaiting preliminary examination. Although the young man was arrested two months ago and remanded for a few days, he still languishes in jail without trial. We hear lots of talk of the rights of British freedom, but here is a case where a British freeman has been kept in jail for about two months without trial. One would almost think the Magna Charter had never been incorporated in the system of British jurisprudence as it is dispensed in the St. John police court. But probably Police Magistrate Ritchie had other and more pressing duties to perform, among which no doubt was the pleasant duty of writing for the Freeman a column and a half of badly worded abuse of the powers which placed him in his office.

That this agent should be a person holding a judicial position almost staggers belief, but the Telegraph withheld the exposure until its evidence could be corroborated beyond successful contradiction. We trust our expose may at least prevent a repetition of the offence.

The Daily Telegraph was putting up a gigantic bluff in its issue of Tuesday last, when it made such a vicious attack on Police Magistrate Ritchie. It was the most villainous sample of journalism that the press of this province has presented to a wondering public for many a year. There can be no doubt in view of the article in question, that the editorial management of the Telegraph has fallen into the hands of buccaneers. We regret for the sake of the minister of railways, that his name is connected with the ownership of the paper. Its course, under its present management has been one of irritating contempt, shown on every possible occasion and in every possible way, for the very class of citizens who have laid the fortunes of the hon. minister himself and of the hirelings whom he employs to edit his political journals. The entire nest of them are dependent for their bread and butter on the political loyalty of the Catholics of this province—not to mention St. John—and yet the Telegraph can find nothing reasonable in the statement of Catholic claims or in the assertion, which needs no proof but an actual knowledge of conditions as they exist in St. John that the Catholics are ignored in civic, provincial and dominion appointments for the one simple reason that they are Catholics. There is no blinking this fact; there is no denying it. And yet, when the Freeman voices the protests of an influential class to whom the profession of their creed is an insurmountable obstacle in the way of advancement in this bigotry-ridden city, we are patronizingly warned not to disturb the public peace, and a Catholic gentleman, whose position is supposed to place him beyond the reach of political controversy, is accused in the boldest and most confident terms of bluster of contributing articles to the Freeman which stir up ill feeling between citizens besides incidentally deceiving the public in questions connected with the administration of the police department.

We have no means of knowing what the police magistrate's views are as to the attack on himself in Tuesday's Telegraph. We cannot speak for him, just as he does not speak for us. We sincerely hope, however, that on his return he will take such legal proceedings as will force the management of the Telegraph either to produce its proofs or crawlfish out of the position it has taken. We shall not be surprised to find that in the end it will be compelled to eat its words, a process of mastication which is not unusual with it of late in cases where the innate bigotry of its editors ran away for the time with their political discretion.

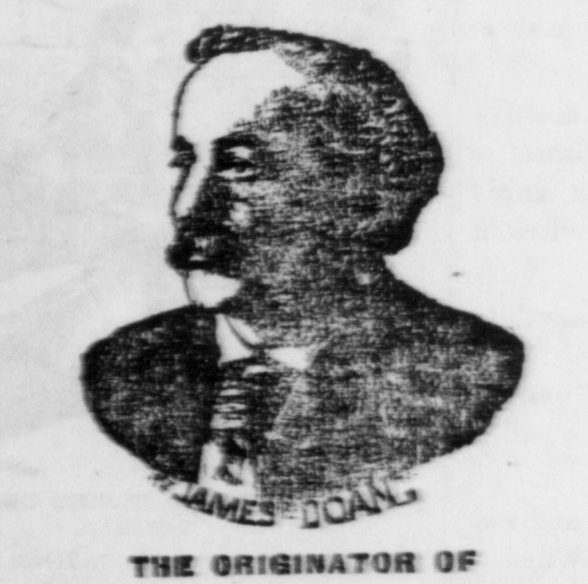
