TEN YEARS IN DORCHESTER PENITENTIARY.—Damien Cormier and Olivier LeBlanc, the two prisoners charged with incendiarism at Buctouche, were tried by Judge Wells on Friday under the Speedy Trials Act. Cormier pleaded guilty to the charge. Some seven or eight witnesses were examined but no evidence could be obtained to connect LeBlanc with the crime, and he was accordingly discharged. Cormier, who was put on the stand after the other witnesses had been examined, gave an account of his whereabouts the night of the fire and stated that he had been unable to work for a number of years and had been getting assistance in whatever way he could from the people. He said he had no assistance from anyone in setting the fire and the only motive he could give for such an act was to get money from some of his friends by warning them of this fire. He told the whole story of how he had set the fire. It seems, from all accounts, that Cormier has been in the habit of setting fires and had on several occasions before warned some of his friends of fires which he said would take place. He was, to use a slang expression, a tough character, and was a dread to the town of Buctouche. When asked what his occupation was, he replied: "I do what I can, get what money I can, live where I can and drink as much whiskey as I can get." Cormier is now fifty-one years of age. Judge Wells, after giving the prisoner a thorough good "dressing down," sentenced him to ten years in Dorchester penitentiary. H. A. McKeown, of St. John, appeared for the crown, and Geo. V. McInerney for the prisoners.

Miss de Olloqui has been in Cuba over a year and has never been sick, and says it is the most delightful climate with fruit and flowers all the year.

—Miss Hudson, who left on Tuesday morning for Boston, was agreeably surprised on Monday evening by being presented, on behalf of the choir and congregation of St. Mary's church, in which church she was organist, with a purse of money and a very nicely composed address, expressing the deep regret at the loss the choir and church would sustain at her departure. Miss Hudson was taken completely by surprise, and in a few words expressed her thanks to the congregation for their kindness. Miss Hudson leaves behind her a host of friends who wish her success.

—James Law, son of Robert Law, of Rexton, died at his home last Thursday, from consumption. Deceased was twenty-three years of age and had been in poor health for some months. He was a member of the I. O. F., and the funeral took place on Sunday under the auspices of that order.

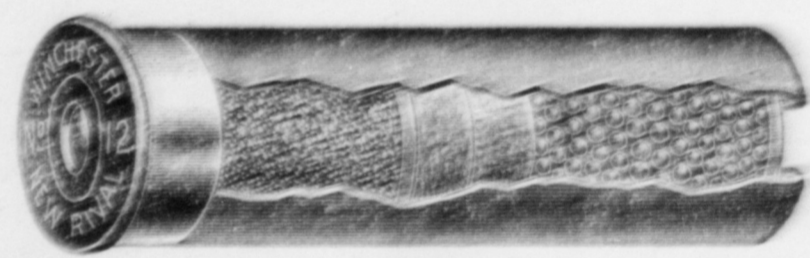
