## Europe's Ice Supply.

Few perhaps among the tourists who visit Norway for the pleasures of its scenery are aware that here they are at the headquarters of Europe's ice sup-To the mountain lakes of that country the continent looks for ice. The ice is of the tinest quality, for the lakes are of crystal clear water, high up in the mountains, and are surrounded by very tall pines. The ice supply is controlled by syndicates.

After having been cut into great squares by plows the blocks of ice are sent down the mountainside on slides. On the way they acquire amazing velocity and plunge into an inclosed pool beyond which are the ice ships awaiting their frozen cargo.

It sometimes happens that through delay in the starting of the vessels or the cutting of unusual quantities from mands the supply runs short. Then it is that ice becomes dear and even in winter time is a luxury that must be when arrested.

However, when this befalls a native he has sense enough to remain indoors and shows his face to no one, for if his chief should ever hear of it he would be tried and sentenced to hard labor and a heavy fine.

DOMINION NEWS.

TORONTO, Sept. 11 .- The American Steel and Wire Co., one of the units of the U. S. Steel Co., has decided to establish a working branch in Canada. It is not vet decided at what point the factory will be located but it is expected to be Toron to. Fifteen acres of land will be required and the industry will employ 2,000 men. OTTAWA, Sept. 12-Mr. W. G. Parmelee, Deputy Minister of Trade and Commerce, who returned from the Maritime Provinces, paid a visit while in Sydney, N. S., to the immense work of the Dominion Steel company. By the new regulation the supervision of output and payments of bounty on all the iron and steel produced in Canada devolves apon the Department of Trade and Commerce, and by all appearances it will be no light

The capacity of the steel works at present in operation and under construction at Sydney is 1,500 tons daily. Allowing for repair delays, the product will be 1,000 tons, on which the company will earn a bounty from the Government of \$3,000 a day. The magnitude of the operations at Sydney may be judged by the fact that the Dominion Company has 2,300 men on its pay roll.


