THE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.—The municipal elections for the county of Kent took place on Tuesday, and in the parishes where more than two candidates were in the field, the election was very hotly contested. In the parish of Richibucto there were five candidates, and a more interesting election the parish has not seen for some time. The day was very disagreeable owing to a heavy mist falling the greater part, and it looked as though a very small vote would be polled. This, however, was not the case, as there was a much larger vote polled than was expected. The voting was very close between Messrs. Murray, Hebert and Peters in the three of the parishes, Murray leading the poll in the town. The total vote was as follows:

Richibucto—Murray, 200; Beers, 137; Hebert, 283; Peters, 226; Richard, 133. Other parishes so far as heard from are: Kouchibouguac—Jardine and Daigle elected by acclamation. St. Louis—F. M. Richard, 167; B. J. Johnson, 155; M. Barriac, 72. Weldford—Reach, 185; Morton, 168; Miller, 156; Carlyle, 135. Harcourt—R. Saulnier and D. W. Clark elected by acclamation.

DEATH OF MR. KEADY O'LEARY.—An other old resident of Richibucto has passed away and this time the town has to mourn the loss of Mr. Keady O'Leary, brother of the late Henry O'Leary, who died last Wednesday morning at the age of 76 years. Deceased had been in his usual health until about ten days before his death, which was due to rheumatism of the heart, and was out as usual the day before he took sick. Mr. O'Leary was born in Castletown, County Cork, Ireland, and came to Richibucto when only 18 years old. He married a Miss Moore some fifty years ago, and she with six children, four girls and two boys, survive him. The girls are Mrs. Daniel Flanagan and Miss Sadie O'Leary, of Richibucto, and Mr. Henry J. Beattie and Miss Maggie O'Leary, of Waltham, Mass. The sons are Wm. K and Daniel L., both of Richibucto. Deceased gentleman was very prosperous in life, being at one time in the fishing and lumbering business, but of late years he has been dealing in hemlock bark and junk. He has for the past seventeen years served as overseer of the poor for the parish of Richibucto, and has always kept the finances of the parish in good shape. He was a man who was well liked by everybody who came in contact with him, and will be much missed. The family have the sympathy of the community. The funeral which took place on Friday morning at nine o'clock was very largely attended notwithstanding the early hour. Rev. E. J. Bannou celebrated high mass in St. Aloysius church, after which the remains were taken to the burying ground at the rear of St. Patrick's hall and interred. The pall-bearers were, Messrs. Wm. Hudson, Robt. Cochran, Reuben Flint, R. McDonald, Thomas Dupray and B. E. Johnson.

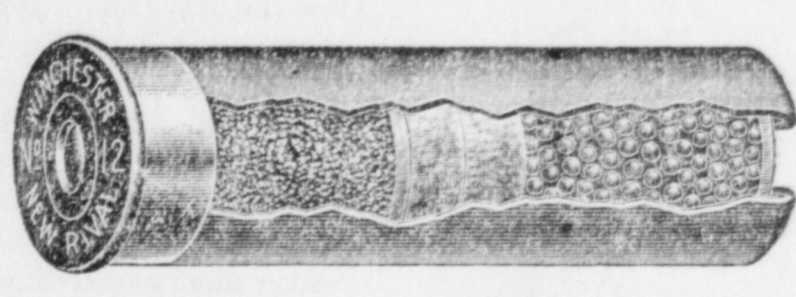
