WINDSOR, Ont., Nov. 9.—The United Gas and Oil Company—removal of whose submarine pipes has been ordered by the Attorney General—is prepared to resist this action and will use armed force if necessary. The company takes the ground that as it is operating under charter from the Dominion government, the Ontario authorities are not vested with power to compel it to take up its pipes or to have them moved. Legal steps will be taken in Toronto to-day to induce the provincial authorities to rescind their peremptory orders, and if these are not successful a collision between the company's employees and the sheriff may be precipitated.

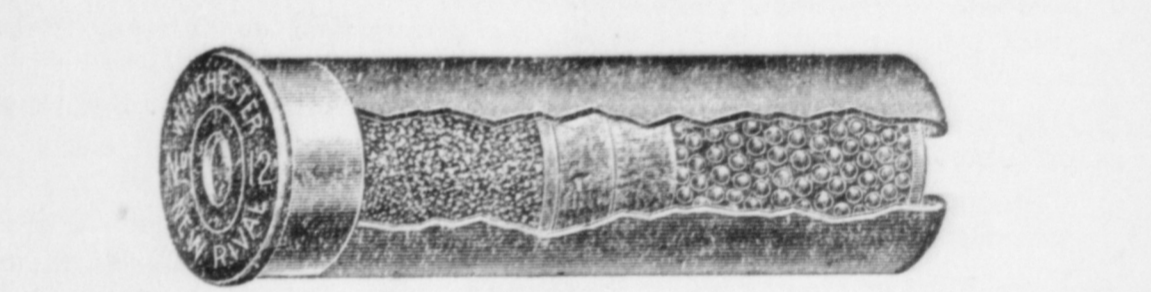
