FUNERAL OF THE LATE JOHN GRAHAM.—The funeral of the late John Graham took place from his late residence on Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. The funeral services at the house and grave were conducted by the Rev. H. A. Meek. The remains were followed to the grave by quite a large procession. The following acted as pall bearers: Wm. Hudson, Martin Flanagan, Benjamin Haines, Sr., Fred Ferguson, Fred S. Sayre and J. D. McMin.

ANOTHER FIRE AT BUCOUCHE.—Fire broke out in G. J. LeBlanc's store at Bucouche at two o'clock Sunday morning and completely destroyed the same, together with the Bay View hotel and Anthony Grattan's house and store. All of the contents of LeBlanc's and Grattan's stores were burned. Grattan had \$1,200 insurance on the buildings but nothing on the stock. His loss is heavy, as he carried a large stock. LeBlanc's loss is also heavy. It is not known what insurance there was on the Bay View. It is supposed the fire was of incendiary origin. Bay View has been burned down four times since 1887, and Grattan was partially burned out in the fire of last spring, when the fire was also supposed to be incendiary. At Bucouche Monday, Constable Phil. Woods, of Richibucto, placed under arrest on the charge of incendiary, Damien Cormier and Oliver White, and it is understood that warrants are out for three other individuals on a similar charge. There is a great amount of talk at Bucouche about the fire and its origin, and the opinion of many is fully expressed. It has been determined in this instance to sift the matter to the bottom, cost what it may. Mr. Gorman's loss will be quite heavy. The hotel was owned by Mr. Irving, and there was about \$1,000 insurance on the furniture. —Moncton Transcript.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN IRVING.—Died at his residence in the town of Richibucto on the 30th ult., John Irving, of the Kent Hotel. He was born on the 25th day of April, 1832. He was of Scottish parentage, both father and mother being among the earliest emigrants to the county. Mr. Irving was a man universally esteemed by all classes of the community, not only for his high moral worth, inflexible honesty in all his dealings, sterling integrity of character, but also for his genial kindness and courtesy to all. He held and honorably and faithfully discharged the duties pertaining to several responsible local offices. He married Miss Susan Kirk, who survives him, and leaves two sons and one daughter, viz. John William Irving, the eldest, who now resides in East Douglas, Mass., and is engaged in a large and flourishing business; Margaret I., wife of George F. Atkinson, who carries on a large commercial business at Rexton, and George A., the genial proprietor of the "Kent." The large concourse of citizens that followed his remains to the last resting place in the Presbyterian burying ground at Rexton bore ample testimony to the esteem in which he was held by all classes of the community in which he lived. Mr. Irving was a man who had no enemies for the best of all reasons he desired none. He had been ill for a short time only as he had lived a long life in peace and friendship with all mankind, so he passed away without a struggle or a pang to dwell forever in peace with his God.

AUG. 31ST.—Death, the great reaper, has once more visited our midst and called home a truly christian man. John Deyarmond was born in Pembroke, Upper Stewiacke, Col. Co., N. S., Feb. 17th, 1841. He removed to Bucouche 26 years ago and for twelve years was elder of the Presbyterian church of that village. He afterwards removed to Strathadam, Miramichi, in the year 1888, where he took an active part in all good works for the elevation of his fellowman. Owing to failing health last fall he came to live with his only child, now the wife of Wm. T. Johnson, of this place, where his christian integrity was truly exemplified by his daily walk in life, but with his disease, which was pronounced by his medical advisors to be deeply seated, the change benefited him but little and in the month of July he rapidly succumbed and on the 15th of August the flickering lamp went out in its darkened chamber and the spirit sought its way into his Redeemer. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord." His wife, who was Hannah Murray, sister of Rev. J. D. Murray, of Red Bank, Miramichi, survives him. Deceased was in his 61st year.

St. John Globe: For the last three or four weeks Nova Scotia apples have been in the local market, but as yet they are very scarce. The ruling whole sale prices at present are: Astrachans, from \$1.75 to \$2.00 per barrel; Sweet Boughs, about \$3.00 for No. 1 stock, and a few "drops". Gravensteins are bringing from \$2.00 to \$3.00. When No. 1 Gravensteins arrive they will be high, from \$3.50 to \$4.00 per barrel it is expected. The crop in the sister province is only about three quarters the yield, and the American crop quarter. Ontario's apples will not be up to the mark as regards quantity, so these deficiencies will have a tendency to stimulate export prices. England and Europe generally will have to pay big money for apples this year, and Canadians themselves will have to stand just as much of a searching.


