SUIT FOR DAMAGES.—Mr. E. Girouard, barrister of Moncton, has been retained to bring suit against the Albert Manufacturing Company for damages for the death of Thomas Collette, formerly of Buctouche, who was killed in the company's plaster quarry at Hillsboro a week or two ago. Collette was at work with another man tunnelling under a bank of earth, to cause it to fall. When the fall occurred, apparently without warning, the other man escaped, but Collette was caught and injured in such a way that he died. Collette left a wife and three children in poor circumstances. His case is an interesting one. He had worked in the quarry before, but at the time of the scare last year, was among the men that left. Coming to Moncton, he remained here until a few weeks ago when he again obtained work in the quarry which cost him his life. It is claimed that the company was negligent in not having an overseer on the spot to warn the men of their danger.—Moncton Times.

DEATH OF MISS MARY WHITE.—We have this week to record the death of an aged lady of Rexton, in the person of Miss Mary White. Deceased, who was 66 years of age, had been ailing for several months but was not confined to her bed until about a month ago when she was taken seriously ill. On Monday, Sept. 30th, she took a bad turn and from then until she died, which was on Saturday morning, suffered continually. Her death, was however, quite unexpected, and was felt as a severe blow to the whole community by whom she was very much loved and highly respected. She leaves two brothers and one sister. Mr. Wm. White, formerly of Richibucto, is a brother, as is also Mr. Walter White, of Shediac, who, with his son Hamilton, drove through to attend the funeral, which took place on Monday afternoon, and was largely attended. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. D. Fraser. Interment took place in the Presbyterian cemetery at Rexton. A BEAUTIFUL MOOSE.—Deputy Crown Land Surveyor, J. Harry Stevenson, while on a survey at the head of Richibucto River, about 9 miles west of Harcourt last week, went out on Saturday evening on a moose hunt, accompanied by a young Indian guide, Tom Canadian, of Fredericton, and at daybreak Monday, Tom began to call, using a birch bark horn, and in thirty-five minutes a very large bull moose appeared, coming to them with head erect. As he got within range Harry got ready for him and when within 135 yards he fired striking him in the fore shoulder dropping him in his tracks. After putting another bullet through his heart they came up to examine their prize and found him to be a perfect beauty. Mr. Keswick, of Mortimore, with a pair of horses brought the carcass out which weighed over 1000 pounds, dressed meat weighed over 600 pounds, and the antlers are certainly magnificent, measuring from tip to tip 64 inches, having seventeen points (9 on one branch and 8 on the other) with a blade of 11 inches. Mr. David Clark, of Harcourt, is dressing the head which he considers to be the finest he has yet seen. Harry is very proud of his success and is being heartily congratulated by his many friends. He, with his usual modesty gives the credit to his young Indian guide Tom, who, he says, is an expert at calling, and would recommend him to any who might wish to engage the service of a guide for moose hunting. This was the only one Harry saw, although others have been seen in that locality at different times this season.
