Three hundred iron moulders in the C. P. R. shops at Montreal have gone on strike. They want an increase in their wages to be minimum rate of \$2.50 a day.

The corner stone of the new Board of Trade building at Montreal was laid on Wednesday.

It is stated that new issue of stock of Dominion Iron and Steel Co., which was underwritten by the Bank of Montreal, Bank of Commerce and the Royal Bank, has been sub-underwritten by gentlemen closely connected with the company, minor stockholders having only applied for 8 per cent. of issue. The price was 57 1/2.

Hon. J. L. Forget and his nephew, Randolph Forget, have presented to the faculty of law of Laval University the valuable law library of the late Judge Gill.

Hon. James Sutherland has caused a careful selection to be made of the localities where additional aids to navigation or improvements to existing aids are required. The following are some of the improvements contemplated: At Cape Race, a quick-flashing light is to be established and the whistle changed to syren. At Cape Pine, a first-rate light and fog signal will be established. The light and signal at Cape Ray are to be improved and the fog alarm at Cape Rosier is to be strengthened and the light made occulting. A new light and fog alarm will be placed on the northwest end of Belle Isle. At Cape Bauld, or Cape Norman, one of the fog alarms will be changed and a lightship will be placed at the east end of Anticosti. Between Fame Point and Quebec a number of improvements are contemplated.
