Military Crimes.

Hardship and privations do not improve the temper, and insubordination easily supervenes, while the temptation of drink, if it is to be had, is too often irresistible to weak but well meaning men long deprived of such dissipation.

Another fruitful source of transgression which, if we are to trust vague reports, became at times epidemic was the almost natural surrender to physical exhaustion, says Major Arthur Griffiths in The Fortnightly Review. To sleep on sentry is one of the most serious of military crimes. It is inexorable from the military point of view, for the safety of thousands may hang upon the vigilance of one man, yet the strain of some wearisome, long protracted march or fatiguing operations will sometimes explain what cannot be defended.

Nor can we shut our eyes to possible guilt of a more contemptible, if not more flagrant, kind. Misbehavior before the enemy—cowardice, in plain English—is not absolutely unknown in our or any other army. It is wiser, perhaps, to draw a veil over its exhibition and the punishment that must follow, yet we cannot shut our eyes to the certainty of its occasional occurrence.

The Divinity of Justice.

The one divine work, the one ordered sacrifice, is to do justice, and it is the last we are ever inclined to do. Anything rather than that; as much charity as you choose, but no justice. "Nay," you will say, "charity is greater than justice." Yes, it is greater; it is the summit of justice; it is the temple of which justice is the foundation. You must build upon justice for this main reason—that you have not at first charity to build with. It is the last reward of good work. Do justice to your brother—you can do that whether you love him or not—and you will come to love him. It is all very fine to think you can build upon charity to begin with, but you will find all you have got to begin with begins at home and is essentially love of yourself.

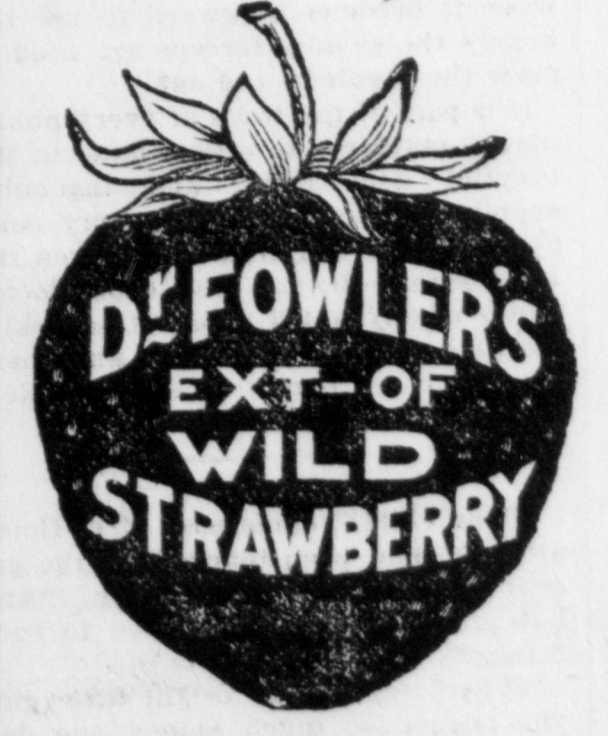
