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KENT COUNTY COUNCIL.

The January term of the Kent County Council met in the Court House at two o'clock p. m., on Tuesday, January 14th, 1902.

The Council being without a Warden, the County Secretary, Mr. McInerney, called the meeting to order, after which he proceeded to read the names of the Councillors for the ensuing term. They are as follows:—

Carleton—George Jardine, Hugh M. Daigle, Acadieville—Sylvain Barrieau, Abram Pineau. St. Louis—Francois M. Richard, Basile J. Johnson. Richibucto—F. S. Peters, Pascal Hebert. Weldford—John Morton, Anthony Roach. Harcourt—Robert Saulnier, David W. Clark. Wellington—John McKee, Gilbert S. Richard. St. Mary's—Clement M. Cormier, Maguire Girouard. St. Paul—Premilite Johnson, Joseph Devarenne. Dundas—Richard Poirier, C. E. Lockhart.

Mr. McInerney then stated that the Councillors were all present, and had taken the necessary oaths.

Coun. F. M. Richard moves that Mr. George Jardine be appointed Warden. Coun. McKee says that he has much pleasure in seconding the motion. There were no other nominations, and Coun. Jardine was unanimously elected as Warden for the ensuing term.

In taking his place, Mr. Jardine said that he thanked the Council for electing him to the office; that he would try to fill it worthily, and if, at any time, he made an error in judgement, he hoped that the older men in the Council would help him out.

Resolved that Philip Woods be appointed constable during the session at \$1.00 per day. Carried.

Resolved that the constable procure paper and pencils for the use of the Council.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the session of last January, also those of the July session. They were both adopted.

It was moved by Coun. Morton, seconded by Coun. McKee and resolved that a committee of three be appointed to confer with the "Monteur Acadien" and the "REVIEW," in reference to having copies printed of the minutes of this session—450 in French and 250 in English, and publishing same in each paper.

On motion, which was seconded and carried, the Warden appointed the following committee:—Councillors Morton, B. J. Johnson, and Poirier.

Mr. McInerney then resigned his office of Secretary. In doing so, he assured the Council of how much it would have delighted him to remain, and of the warm place which Richibucto, and the County of Kent had always held in his heart. He said that it was twenty-two years since he was appointed to this position, and during

that time he had seen many changes, new faces had come and old faces gone, but that there were some men here who were at the council during that time. Mr. Roach, elected for the Parish of Weldford, was a Councillor at that time, and there are other councillors here who have been here a very long time. Mr. Peters was here at that time and Mr. Patrick Gratton. He had seen some good Council Boards here, and we generally have good Council Boards. The councillors do not seem to care whom they please or whom they displease, but work only for the good of the county.

He concluded by saying, "I know the faces, I know the names, and I know the characters of every man who sits among you to-day, and I leave you the best wishes for the New Year and for the prosperity and benefit of the County, which we all love so well."

Coun. McKee spoke very feelingly with reference to losing Mr. McInerney. He concluded, by moving that the resignation be accepted.

Coun. Richard said that he seconded not only Mr. McKee's motion, but also every word which he had said with reference to their loss in Mr. McInerney.

The Warden also spoke with regret for the loss which they would sustain by Mr. McInerney's resignation.

Coun. Johnson said that he was sorry that it was necessary to accept Mr. McInerney's resignation, and he hoped that his successor would only fill the office as well as he filled it.

Coun. Peters, Coun. Barrieau and others also expressed their regret.

The Warden then said that Mr. McInerney having resigned and his resignation having been accepted, it would be necessary to elect another Secretary.

Coun. Richard moved that Mr. F. J. Robidoux be appointed Secretary for the County of Kent. Coun. Johnson seconded the motion.

Mr. McKee said that he had no objection to Mr. Robidoux himself, but that he thought that we should not have an imported man. He said, "do you mean to tell me that there is no man in Kent fit to fill the position?" He said that other things being equal, he would give the preference to a man speaking both languages,

but that he thought it was a mistake to import a man. He concluded by moving that Havelock James be nominated.

Coun. Richard and Coun. McKee each spoke again, in favor of their own nominees.

Coun. B. J. Johnson said that he always thought that this election would take place without much discussion. He said that both gentlemen now nominated were fully known to the board, and the talents of each were fully appreciated, but that he thought that a man who had been with them as their servant, and performed the duties for the board, ought not to be branded as an imported man.

Coun. Hebert moved that the vote be taken by ballot.

Mr. Richardson then asked permission to have a petition read. It was granted, and Mr. McInerney read Mr. Richardson's petition, asking that the Council elect him as their Secretary, if only for one term.

Coun. Morton moved that Mr. Richardson's petition be placed on file. Seconded by Coun. Saulnier, and resolved.

Moved by Coun. McKee, seconded by Coun. Clark and resolved that Mr. H. H. James be heard before the board.

Mr. James after thanking the Council for the privilege of speaking, said that in making that application, he did not come as a stranger at all. That he was born in this town, and his father had lived here for a half a century before him; and while he had a very high respect for Mr. Robidoux, that he had only come here about two years ago, and while do doubt, capable of filling the position, he did not think that it was fair or just that Mr. Robidoux should be appointed to the position of Secretary for this County, before older men who have lived here all their lives, and paid taxes year after year.

He said that he believed that Mr. Robidoux had only paid taxes to the amount of 75cts. That it had been canvassed against him that he was holding an office bringing him \$800 00. That this was untrue. As a matter of fact, the salary coming to him as Judge of Probates, was only \$110 00.

Coun. Richard moved, that as Mr. James had made his speech, that Mr. Robidoux be heard before the Council.

The motion was seconded by Coun. Johnson. Carried.

Mr. Robidoux said that he should not speak at this time but that his friend Mr. James, had mis-stated facts, in saying that he had only paid taxes to the amount of 75cts. As a matter of fact, he said, he was assessed on three hundred dollars; that Mr. Cochrane would support him in this. He also said that he thought that it might be a good thing for an official like the Secretary of the County, to be able to speak both languages; and stated that he did not deserve the title of an imported man, because when a few weeks old he had been brought into Kent county, and spent the first four or five years of his life here.

Coun. Richard said that he thought, according to rule, that it was his right to close the discussion. He did so by saying that Mr. Robidoux had been trained two years for this office.

The motion that this vote be taken by ballot was then put to the Council. It was carried, and Mr. Woods was called upon for ballots, and Couns. McKee and Pineau were appointed as tellers.

The votes were counted and declared to be fifteen for Mr. Robidoux and five for Mr. James. Mr. Robidoux was declared elected, and it was resolved by the Council that Mr. Robidoux take his position.

Coun. Morton said that he should like to put a motion. It was, that the Warden appoint a Committee of three to draft out a testimonial, to present to Mr. McInerney, before ten o'clock to-morrow morning, in the Council chamber. The motion was seconded by Coun. Lockhart, and resolved.

The Warden appointed the following: Couns. Lockhart, Basile J. Johnson and Morton.

Resolved that the Warden appoint the Finance Committee, one councillor from each Parish. He appoints the following: Hugh M. Daigle, Carleton; Abram Pineau, Acadieville; Francois M. Richard, St. Louis; F. S. Peters, Richibucto; John Morton, Weldford; Robert Saulnier, Harcourt; Maguire Girouard, St. Mary's; C. C. Lockhart, Dundas, and John McKee, Wellington.

On motion by Coun. Peters, it was resolved that Mr. McInerney transfer all books, records and all papers and documents pertaining to his office to his successor, Mr. Robidoux.

Council then adjourned till to-morrow at 10 a. m.

MORNING SESSION.

Jan. 15, 1902.

At ten o'clock the Warden calls the meeting to order, with every councillor in attendance.

The secretary reads the minutes of Tuesday's meeting, which are adopted.

The Warden then calls for "Reports of Committees."

Coun. McKee said he was chairman of the Wharf Committee, and he would like to have till to-morrow to prepare his report. Granted.

Coun. Morton then submits his report for the Committee appointed to confer with THE REVIEW and the Monteur Acadien concerning prices at which they would furnish pamphlets containing report of this session's proceedings. The report stated that the committee had interviewed the representatives of each paper and had obtained the offer of having 250 of these pamphlets printed in English and 450 in French, for \$20.00 and \$25.00 respectively. After some little discussion as to the number of copies it was best to have printed, the Council seemed to agree that the number named would be sufficient, and it was moved by Coun. Peters, seconded by Coun. Daigle and resolved that the committee's report be adopted.

Coun. Morton, Chairman of the committee appointed to prepare a testimonial to present to Mr. McInerney, that the committee had decided with the approval of the Council to defer the reading of the testimonial till six o'clock this evening,

when all the county officers could be invited, and a supper given in Mr. McInerney's honor. This was taken as a motion seconded by Coun. Lockhart and resolved.

At the request of the Warden a letter was read, written by Mr. Hamilton from the Moncton Hospital, calling upon the County of Kent for a grant, to help them somewhat in erecting a larger and more suitable building. It was moved by Coun. Peters, seconded by Coun. Johnson and resolved, that the letter just read be filed for further consideration.

Coun. Morton said, that in their meeting of yesterday, there was no question of salary. He now moved that the Secretary's salary be the same as it was, viz. \$300.00 per year. The motion was seconded by Coun. Clark and resolved.

Coun. Morton moved that the Deben-ture committee report to the Board. Coun. Peters moved, seconded by Coun. Richard, that this committee have till to-morrow afternoon at two o'clock to report. Carried.

At the request of Couns. McKee and B. Johnson, Auditor W. D. Carter, submits his annual report, which is as follows:—

Mr. Carter, after reading his report, said, that from it, it would be seen that the affairs of the county were in a much better state than usual, and he thought that the Council were to be congratulated.

Coun. Johnson said that although he had been in the council for a long time, he had never seen better reports made than while Mr. Carter was Auditor, and he moved that the Auditor's report be accepted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Barrieau and resolved.

The Warden stated that he had some communications which should be read to the council. Upon motion it was resolved that they be read by the Secretary. Mr. Robidoux then read a letter from Mr. Leger, ex-Warden, to be presented among others, to their Royal Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York. He also read a letter from Hon. L. J. Tweedie, asking that the address be written and the address itself, which he had prepared with the help of Mr. G. V. McInerney.

Resolved upon motion by Mr. Peters that a copy of the address presented to the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, be ingrafted in the minutes of the council.
