The January term of the Kent County Council met in the Court House at two o'clock p. m., on Tuesday, January 14th,

The Council being without a Warden, the County Secretary, Mr. McInerney, called the meeting to order, after which he proceeded to read the names of the Councillors for the ensuing term. They are as follows:-

Carleton-George Jardine, Hugh M. Daigle. Acadieville-Sylvain Barrieau Abram Pineau. St. Louis-Francois M. Richard, Basile J. Johnson. Richibucto-F. S. Peters, Pascal Hebert. Mr. McInerney then stated that the Councillors were all present, and had taken the necessary oaths.
