ture. Couns. McKee, Daigle, Roach, Morton, Clark, F. M. Richard, Johnson and Poirier, take part in this discussion, and Mr. H. M. Ferguson, of Rexton, asks for two minutes to speak on the matter. The Clerk of the Peace, being asked for his advice, states, that by the new law, taxation follows property.

Coun. Johnson again brings up the matter referring to Auctioneers, and said that Mr. Hebert ought either to be reimbursed or that the other auctioneers should be made to pay their license fees.

Mr. Lockhart said that he thought that all auctioneers had a right to pay their licenses as well as Mr. Hebert and he thought that the bill should be sent into them, and if they did not pay it, that it would be well to refuse them license. He would make a motion to that effect.

Mr. Roach said that suppose a man did not want a license last year, but wished one this year and paid his license fee, could he be refused one. As Clerk of the Peace, Mr. Hutchinson, said that the Council had nothing whatever to do with the granting of licenses; that it was statutory law, and the Municipality had nothing whatever to do with it. Coun. Lockhart withdrew his motion.

The Council then adjourned until two o'clock in the afternoon.

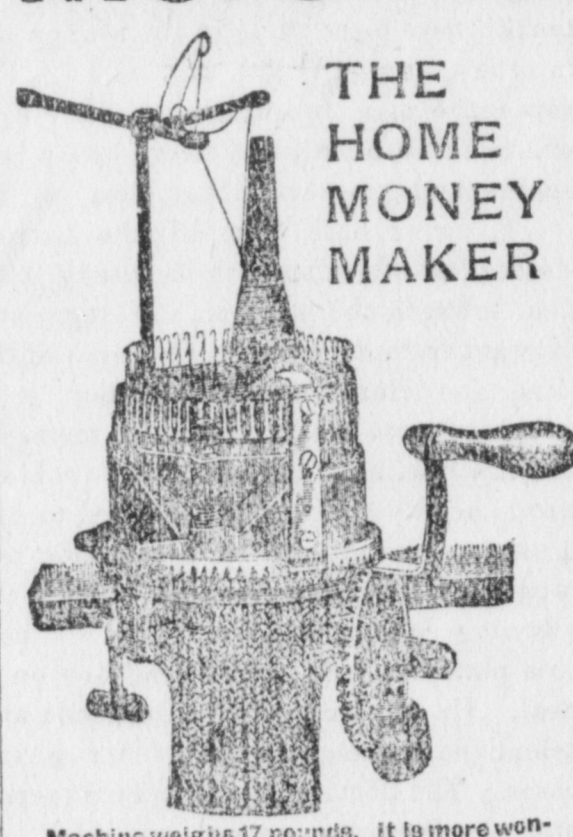
