KENT COUNTY COUNCIL.

Continued from page 5.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Jan. 15, 1902.

At two o'clock, the Warden calls the Council to order, upon which a motion is made by Coun. Morton, seconded by Coun. Richard, that the Warden appoint a Committee of three to confer and make arrangements with the Royal Bank of Canada at Rexton, to borrow an amount of money not to exceed the February issue of the School Warrant. The motion was carried, and the following committee appointed: Warden Jardine, Coun. B. J. Johnson, and Sylvain Barribeau.

Moved by Coun. Johnson, as a Bye Law (he had given notice of it yesterday afternoon) seconded by Coun. Barribeau, that beginning with this session, all bills with which Councilors are personally interested, whether for pay or otherwise, shall be submitted to, and considered by the Council in full session, and such bills before being submitted will have to be sworn. Carried.

Upon motion by Coun. Peters, it was resolved, the ex-Secretary being present, that the address prepared be read and presented to him. Mr. Lockhart then read the address (all present standing), which is as follows:—

The Municipality of the County of Kent, in general session convened, desire to convey to Geo. V. McInerney, Esq., our late Secretary, their regret at his resignation of the office he has filled with such marked ability, faithfulness and integrity, for the extended term of twenty-two years.

No language we are capable of employing, can adequately express the true sentiment we experience, or our appreciation of his gentlemanly deportment, his kindness, and the obliging manner in which he discharged the onerous and varied duties of a very responsible office, to the entire satisfaction, as well as the general advancement of the people of Kent, showing no preference to nationality, creed or country.

Representing every parish in the County as we do, we feel, we echo, the true feelings of all classes, when we state, that in his departure from the county, he has left behind him a reputation of which he and his family may ever cherish with feelings of pride and satisfaction, being untarnished by any act, discreditable to himself or hostile to the best interests of his native county; and we hope, in his new home, his estimable character in all the

relations of life, may be as warmly appreciated as they are by the people of the County of Kent.

Mr. McInerney thanked the Councilors in an address worded and delivered in his usual graceful style.

Moved by Coun. F. Richard, seconded by Coun. Johnson, and unanimously resolved, that the address presented to Mr. McInerney appear in the minutes.

Coun. Johnson brought up the matter of some Auctioneers, who he said were going about the County auctioneering, and who he did not believe had paid their fee. The matter of licenses for pedlars was also brought up. Quite a discussion was raised and taken part in by the Warden, Coun. Morton and others.

It was moved by Coun. Peters, seconded by Coun. Daigle and resolved that the Council adjourn to allow the Finance committee to go into session.

MORNING SESSION.

January 16, 1902.

At ten o'clock the Warden takes the chair and calls the Council to order.

Minutes of Wednesday's meeting were read and approved.

It was moved by Coun. McKee, seconded by Coun. F. M. Richard, and resolved, that the matter relating to the Moncton hospital be left over until to-morrow.

Coun. Saulnier submits his report for the Jail committee. It contained a statement for improvements made in the buildings and yard of the Court house.

Moved by Coun. Peters, seconded by Coun. Clark and resolved that the report, as read, be received.

Coun. Johnson was of the opinion that all these bills ought to be sworn. According to his judgment, this bill was overcharged. Coun. Hebert did not think it was necessary, but that when the Finance committee found that too much was charged that they could cut it down. Coun. Johnson did not agree with him. He said that it would take up too much of the Finance committee's time, going over all the bills and cutting them down. He thought that these bills out to be certified to before a magistrate.

Coun. Clark spoke of a bill which he had brought in at one time for Constable fees. He said that the bill looked large, although it was well earned and that the Finance committee had cut it down to half the amount. He thought that when a bill was sworn to, that it should not be cut down. Coun. B. Johnson said that when he was on the Finance committee that constables bills were often brought in which were overcharged and that the Finance committee had to cut them down. Coun. Lockhart said that he thought, and from the applause which followed his remarks, there were a number who agreed with him, that bills ought not to be cut down, but if the Finance committee found a bill not correct they ought to throw it out altogether till it were brought in correctly.

Coun. Clark spoke again in reference to constable's bills, after which Coun. McKee announced that Constable Woods would like a few minutes to speak on the matter. On motion by B. J. Johnson and F. M. Richard, Mr. Woods was granted permission to speak. After stating that he had been constable for a good while and had always got the amount of his bills, Mr. Woods took advantage of the occasion to bring in two bills which he said Stipendiary Magistrate Davis would not sign, but which were just bills. They were referred to the Finance and Audit committee.

Coun. McKee said that he thought that they were back to where they started. That it was a very important matter which they had been considering, and if they did not treat the constables justly, that they would refuse to work; that mag-

istrates did wrong by trying to turn civil cases into criminal cases, and that the County had bills where they should not have. He said that if the Council passed a law that all bills sworn to should be paid, he did not see what work there would be for the Finance committee. He thought that the Local government should pass a law to protect the County. He concluded by saying that he had sat at the Finance Board for many years, and he thought that the committee always tried to do its duty.

After a few more words by Coun. Peters and Coun. Clark, the discussion was closed by Coun. Daigle moving that all existing Bye Road Divisions in Parish of Carleton, be done away with and the following be made.

No. 1. All Bye Roads, South of Kouchibouguac River.

No. 2. All Bye Roads, West of Post road on North side of River.

No. 3. All Roads from Post Road to Carrigan Creek.

No. 4. Carrigan Creek to Chapel in Pt. Sapin.

No. 5. From Chapel to County Line of Northumberland.

The motion was seconded by Coun. Peters and resolved.

Coun. McKee submits a petition from Mr. J. D. Irving, Buctouche, asking for exemption from taxation on his Wool and Grist Mill, for twenty years.

After considerable discussion taken part in by Coun. Richard, Coun. Johnson and others, Coun. McKee, at the suggestion of Coun. Roach, moves that the prayer of the petition be granted, altering the number of years to ten instead of twenty. After more discussion taken part in by Couns. Johnson, McKee, Richard and Hebert, Coun. B. Johnson said that he was willing to exempt these mills from taxation till the next general valuation was taken.

Coun. Peters said that it seemed simply a matter for the Parish of Buctouche, as it did not effect the valuation of other parishes in the County. Clerk of the Peace, Mr. Hutchinson, supported him in this. Coun. McKee again made a motion that the Flour and Woolen Mill of Mr. J. D. Irving be exempt from taxation for ten years. The motion was seconded by Coun. Richard, and resolved.

On motion by Couns. McKee and Daigle, the Treasurer, Mr. W. E. Forbes, submits his report, which is as follows:—
