Here a change is to be noted, there is another change, and still the resident of half dozen years ago visiting Buctouche today, will, while acknowledging the changes, be forced to the conclusion that it is still Buctouche, the same and not the same, improved and not improved, still active and alert, with its quota of laziness and idleness, with a people who are generous, hospitable, and warm-hearted.

Buctouche, Now And Then.

The writer after an absence of about half a dozen years in visiting Buctouche notes many changes, some for the better, some not for the better. The first thing for the worse that the eye notes is the old stone walls of the Bay View Hotel, E. J. L. LeBlanc's store, A. D. Cormier's store, and a small shanty which marks the place formerly occupied by the handsome building belonging to A. Grattan, and the distressed appearance of the highway bridge.

Some of the more pronounced improvements that strike the eye are first and foremost the new flour mill belonging to J. D. Irving, though which the foreman, Mr. Freeman, of Bruce, Ontario, kindly conducted us.

This mill is fitted out to furnish flour equal to any in Canada; a new process of wetting the grain with water instead of steaming it is now being put in.

Another important improvement which has entailed a vast amount of labor and patient care and thought has been the finishing of the interior of St. Jean Baptiste Church. This church was founded in 1785 and has been several times destroyed, the last time by the tornado of 1873; in 1886, the Rev. Father Michaud began the present structure, and to-day he can be proud of the fact that he has the largest wooden church in Canada, and one of the handsomest, especially in the interior decorations.

The reverend gentleman has planted a beech grove adjoining the church. Other buildings which have added much to the appearance of the place are the residences, offices and stores of H. Hutchinson, A. Irving is now much different, then it was of the past ages, now he has one of the model twentieth century stores.

Another improvement is the extension of the railway the whole length of the public wharf.
