MR. BLAIR IN MONCTON.

Hon. Mr. Blair arrived here last evening and leaves to night for the east on a tour of inspection of the Intercolonial Railway.

Mr. Blair may be pardoned, if, when reaching the city he looks at the improvement on the I. C. R., the enlarged yard, the increased tracks, the artistic and pretty railway station, and its neatly arranged grounds, and recalls the conditions which prevailed before he became Minister of Railways. He is popular with the I. C. R. employes, and why should he not be? No Minister of Railways ever before took so deep and personal an interest in the welfare of the employes as does the present Minister of Railways.

The wages of the greater portion of the employes have been substantially improved under his administration and the limit of improvement it is hoped has not yet been reached.
